AN OLD RESIDENT GONE.—Ezekiel Harris, of Standing Stone, died very suddenly at the residence of his son, Wm. Griffis, Esq., on the first day of the month, and when taken up life was extinct. He was born near Albany, New York, and was 78 years old, and for 70 years had resided in Snesehanna and Bradford Counties. He had lived for many years at Standing Stone, and had been an enterprising and active citizen, and contributed largely by his labors in settling the portion of the County.

INDUCEMENTS TO FARMERS.—The present season is one of trouble and national perplexities. We are in a state of depression. All classes of business is depressed, and money is most emphatically a cash article. Business in our cities is stagnated—merchants failing and mechanics out of employment. In fact, almost all business, excepting the soil, has come to a dead stand. Yet, notwithstanding all this depression of business, people are not, and the farmer must raise enough adequate to demand. Thousands of farmers and farmer's sons are enticed and gone to fight their country's battles—soldiers must be fed, and it behooves every farmer, year by year, to put in a double crop of grain and vegetables. The war continues any length of time, provisions of all kinds will be in great demand. They will be needed and scarce. Produce of all kinds will bring a large price, and the farmer will receive ready market and a large compensation for his products.

MORE VOLUNTEERS DETAINED AT STANDING STONE.—Another company of volunteers, the Troy Guards, from Bradford County, was detained at this place on Monday, says the Sunbury American of the 13th inst. They were to be cared for by our citizens until next day, but some bad management in this matter. Why volunteers should be so often detained at this point, and no provisions made for them, either by the Government or individual Company, is hard to say. If the Government would prevent their coming, they should take measures to arrest their progress at the starting point. The volunteers from this County have all had an opportunity to test the hospitality of the Sunbury people, and they speak in glowing terms of the readiness and willingness with which their wants were ministered to, and they will retain a good name with the people of this County.

We learn from persons coming from the sections of the county, that the prospect for every year. The apple trees are not putting out blossoms generally as was the case last year, although some sections the trees are tolerably well loaded—in other sections there will be but a very few apples this year, even if all the blossoms produce ripened fruit. There will be an entire lack of all other kinds of orchard crops except the apple. The peach, pear, plum and cherry trees all failed. The cherry, more particularly, appears to have had fruit buds started quite early, perhaps during the warm weather in February and March, but they were killed by the succeeding severely cold weather, which had several weeks, and even the best buds, on the cherry, peach and pear trees, appear to have been frozen and destroyed, so that new ones are just forming, and it may be some time before they are ready to bud, still by observation new buds will be found.
