Being myself at farrisburg when the war bill was passed, and under-Manding the facts, I can unquallifiedly deny the allegaon. Simple justice to Mr. LANDON seems to require the facts to be given. The case is simply this: The general Il appropriating three millions of dollars for the purpose of arming the State and paying the expenses of the afteen regiments of State tr ops, kept as a reserve force. originated in the House and contained a clause giving our soldiers five dollars per month extra pay. This bill Passed the House, and before coming up in the Senate passed through the hands of the Finance Committee, who Munck out the extra pay. The bill as amended passed the Senate and subsequently the House, Mr. LANDON voting for the bill in its amended form. After the passage the war bill, as amended, Mr. LANDON introduced and passed the most important bill for the volunteers that was Passed during the session-a bill giving pay and rations to all the volunteers called into the service of the State, b commence two days prior to their marching from home. I make the above statement from a personal knowledge of the facts, and a matter of justice to our Senator.


