The College year is divided into three terms of 14 weeks each. The Anniversary exercises will be held at the close of the Spring term.

No deduction will be made for absence, except in case of protracted illness of over two weeks.

Instrumental Music will not, as heretofore, be taught in the school, but will be arranged for a class, and will be taught in a hall during the recesses of the Institute, by the Teacher of Vocal Music.

This arrangement has been adopted for the past term, and experience has proved it to be eminently superior to the plan pursued in former years. Special pains will be taken to secure the greatest progress of those wishing to learn instrumental music.

Students are recommended to students from abroad who have a desire to improve themselves, as better opportunities for advancement in study are thereby secured.

Normal Department.—Special exercises are arranged without extra charge for those preparing themselves as Teachers of Common Schools. Prof. G. L. COBURN, the able and well known Superintendent of Common Schools in the county, has kindly consented to receive the Teachers and direct their studies in preparation.

He will also be present to conduct his exercises as often as practicable, and will deliver frequent lectures on the Theory and Practice of Teaching, as also on other subjects connected with Normal training.

These exercises, therefore, continuing to engage in teaching for the winter, will be held in greatly to their advantage to be present during the Fall term.

Prof. Coburn's connection with the Institution is not such as to in any way interfere with the discharge of the regular duties of his office.

As the business of the Faculty and Trustees in establishing the high reputation of the institution has hitherto enjoyed, and is rendering it more worthy of future patronage and support.
