COURT PROCEEDINGS.—The September Term of Court commenced on Monday, 2d inst., Hon. U. M. MASON, President, and Hon. JOHN F. LANE and Hon. JOHN PASMORE, Associate Judges.

Don M. Bacon—Assault and Battery, same, James Condon—Selling liquor to druggards, &c. Steven L. Agney—Larceny, James Malory—Assault and battery, James Malory—Violation of liquor laws, Daniel Beardsley, same, Joshua Benjamin, same, Nelson Vanderpool, same, Peter Hollenback, same, Ambrose Vanderpool—Fraud, Isaac N. Evans—Assault and battery, Nathan Parker—Larceny, Elijah Horton—Assault and battery, Isaac Hollenback, same, Peter Hollenback, same, Jeremiah Hollenback, same, J. G. M. Elshere—Selling liquor on Sunday, same, Selling liquor to minors, Randolph L. Beardsley—Assault and battery, Ambrose Vanderpool, same, Francis Ripley—Embezzlement.

Not a true bill and county for costs. William Russell—Assault and battery. A large amount of Commonwealth business engaged the attention of the Court, consisting principally of assaults, surety of the peace, and other trifling matters. In several cases, the defendants pleaded guilty, and in others the parties took the "sober second thought," and arranged their difficulties without the assistance of Court and Jurors.

Com. vs. Elijah Horton—Brought from May Sessions, indicted for assault and battery upon his wife. Defendant pleads guilty and is sentenced to pay a fine of \$10 to the Commonwealth, the costs of prosecution, and undergo an imprisonment in the County Jail, &c. Com. vs. Abraham Steel—Brought from May Sessions, indicted for assault and battery upon W. J. N. Henson, in West Burlington. After hearing, defendant withdraws his plea of guilty and pleads guilty.

Com. vs. Isaac Powers.—In the Oyer and Terminer—Brought from May Sessions. Defendant was indicted for entering the room of Peter V. Bennett, at the hotel of Isaac Howell, in Standing Stone, and taking from his pockets a sum of money. Jury found the defendant not guilty. Com. vs. James Condon—Indicted for furnishing liquor to Mary Coleman, a person of known intemperate habits. Found guilty and sentenced to pay a fine of \$5, costs of prosecution, and undergo an imprisonment of 30 days in the County Jail.

Com. vs. Daniel Dibble—Surety of the peace on complaint of Benjamin Hoyt. Proceedings from J. Vanhook, Esq. After hearing, Court ordered the defendant to enter into recognizance in the sum of \$300, conditioned that he keep the peace towards all the good citizens of the Commonwealth, and particularly towards Benjamin Hoyt for the space of one year. Com. vs. Samuel Thompson—Surety of the peace on complaint of Dr. J. H. Cole. Proceedings from Thomas Mather, Esq. After hearing defendant required to give bail in the sum of \$200.

Com. vs. Daniel Beardsley—Indicted for assault and battery. Defendant pleads guilty and is sentenced to pay a fine of \$15 to the Commonwealth, the costs of prosecution, and undergo an imprisonment of ten days in the County Jail. Com. vs. Steven L. Agney—Indicted for entering the store of David Gardner, at Orrutt's Creek, and taking from his safe about \$709 in money. Defendant pleads guilty.

Com. vs. James Malory—Indicted for selling liquor without license, at Grandville Summit. After hearing, defendant withdraws his plea of not guilty, and pleads guilty, and the Court sentenced him to pay a fine of \$20 to the Commonwealth and the costs of prosecution. Com. vs. J. B. Watts—Defendant was indicted for an assault and battery upon his wife. Upon being arraigned he pleads guilty, and the parties made each a statement to the Court, disclosing a distressed state of matrimonial intimacy. The Court sentenced the defendant to pay a fine of \$10, costs of prosecution, and give security for his good behavior, &c.

Com. vs. Daniel Beardsley—Indicted for assault and battery. Defendant pleads guilty and is sentenced to pay a fine of \$15 to the Commonwealth, the costs of prosecution, and undergo an imprisonment of ten days in the County Jail. Com. vs. Steven L.
