ROBBER.—The Harrisburg Daily Telegraph, of the 29th ult. has the following:—C. R. Coates, Esq., County Superintendent of Bradford county, was in attendance, as a delegate from that county at the recent State Educational Convention, met with a serious loss at the depot in our city, at noon to-day, through the operations of one of the adroit pickpockets who are ever on the alert in that locality to pounce upon unsuspecting strangers. It appears that Mr. Coates, on an hour or so previous to the robbery, drew his salary from the State as County Superintendent, which amounted to \$500. He had in his pocket \$500 bills, one hundred and twenty dollars in \$10 bills, about thirty dollars in \$5 bills, and three dollars in gold dollar pieces. This money was in his wallet, and he proceeded to the depot where he purchased a ticket for Washington city, and was in the act of getting in the train of cars for that place when he discovered that his pocket book was missing. He immediately gave the alarm, but, of course, amidst a promiscuous crowd, the discovery of the thief proved impossible. Mr. Coates remained in the depot, and made known his loss to the Mayor, who has taken measures for detecting the thief. Mr. Coates is a sober man, and the loss to him is a very serious one.

The Montrose Democrat, of the 28th ult. contains the following particulars of two accidents, which occurred in this county, on Tuesday evening the 14th inst., about dusk, David Millard, of Auburn, and his wife and three children, and Philip Hall and wife, of Spring Hill, in Bradford county, Michael DeLand and Harris Roberts, of Auburn, who were in a wagon returning from the river, and when they reached Spring Hill, in Bradford county, Michael DeLand attempted to pass them—Millard having previously been by DeVine. On turning a corner, near Mr. DeLand's house, the two women were thrown out—Mrs. DeLand falling a child in her arms. She struck, as is supposed, on her head, knocking a hole in her forehead through which a portion of her brains protruded. There were also marks of three contusions on the side of her head, supposed to be caused by one of DeLand's horses trampling upon her in passing. The wagon was overturned by her crashing her hip. She died on Friday last. Mrs. Hall was also run over and injured seriously, but not dangerously. The child was not hurt. Millard drove about seven miles before he or Hall knew the women were thrown out; they then stopped and took the women to Sillery's.

On Monday, November 18th, Patrick McGavin, of this county, was in the barn of Elijah Adams, at Auburn Four miles, and with Mr. A. was looking at a young mare, when she kicked Mr. McGavin in the breast. He walked to the house, and died in about twenty minutes.

TERIBLE TRAGEDY.—The Elmira Advertiser, of a recent date, has the following:—We are indebted to Mr. E. W. Taylor, of this village, for the particulars of a terrible tragedy which occurred yesterday at Maple Ridge, Pa., a small village on the road to Tioga, about twenty miles from the State line.

Two brothers named William and Alonzo Lattin, were engaged in a quarrel, when Alonzo struck William with a stick, cutting open his head from the top clear down through the forehead and nose. Mr. Taylor describes the quarrel as follows:—The quarrel was the most awful sight ever witnessed. Strange to say, the man was not seriously hurt, but was still living when Mr. Taylor arrived, though the doctor said it was impossible for him to live but a few minutes longer. The infuriated Alonzo, after inflicting this fearful blow, struck him upon the back of the head with the axe.

The cause of the quarrel was unknown, but Alonzo fulfilled himself to the people, saying that he was acting in self-defense. It must have been an extreme case, as it would thus require to chop his brother in pieces. A singular fact that instead of being arrested on the spot, Alonzo was sent to the State line for trial to see if he could be sent to the penitentiary.
