WHAT IS IT TO FRED AN ARMY.—The members, regulars and volunteers, now in the field, in the course of organization, amount, in round numbers, to nearly 700,000 men. It may be interesting to know, what an army of this strength will consume in the course of one month. We therefore append the following items, which are strictly correct: 1,000,000 pounds of pork; 1,000,000 barrels of flour; 1,000,000 bushels of beans; 1,000,000 pounds of rice; 1,000,000 pounds of coffee; 2,000,000 pounds of sugar; 1,000,000 gallons of vinegar; 12,000,000 bushels of salt; 2,000,000 pounds of candles; 1,200,000 pounds each week, and exp. 7,000,000 pounds.

CLOTH MITTENS.—A lady correspondent of the New York papers calls attention to the fact that cloth mittens could be made for our soldiers with sewing machines at a comparatively small cost. In this respect, she thinks our army could be provided with these necessities before cold weather sets in. She says the mittens should be strong and soft, and the mittens should be made of the cloth. They may be found with three buttons or woolsen, and if well made would last three seasons with ordinary usage. The suggestion may be worthy of attention. Knit mittens are undoubtedly preferable if they can be furnished in time; but if not, the sewing machines might be called into requisition to advantage.

ULYSSES MENCER was read as President Judge of the 13th Judicial District, for ten years from the 1st day of December, 1861, and the commission of Hon. VOLNEY M. LONG, as Associate Judge, for five years from the 1st day of December, 1861.

The Grand Jury returned the following bills: ALONZO FURMAN—Passing counterfeit coin. CHARLES CARTER—Assault and Battery. MARY COLLUM, do. HONEST HENRY PEDERS—Larceny. MARTIN LOVE, do. JAMES P. BELDEN, do. SAMUEL DEWEY, do. PETER SHANKLAND—Rape. LORENZO D. AYERS—Larceny. VALERIA EILWAL—Larceny. Geo. Johnson—Passing counterfeit money.

CONVICTS.—Peter Shankland—Indicted for Rape, committed in Albany township. The defendant was a negro, and pleaded in extenuation that he was intoxicated at the time of perpetrating the outrage. The jury found him guilty, and the Court sentenced him to undergo an imprisonment of fourteen years and ten months in the Penitentiary.

CONVICTS.—Charles Carter—Indicted at present session for assault and battery upon Mrs. Vanderpool, in Towanda town. The jury found him guilty. Convict v. Mary Collum—Indicted for assault and battery upon Lake Dolan. The jury found the defendant not guilty and divided the costs equally between the prosecutor and defendant.

CONVICTS.—Honest Henry Peders—Indicted at present sessions for Larceny. The jury found the defendant not guilty. Convict v. Martin Love—Indicted at present sessions for receiving stolen goods. Found guilty. Sentenced to pay a fine of \$5, the costs of prosecution, and undergo an imprisonment for the term of six months in the County Jail.

CONVICTS.—Samuel Dewey—Indicted at present sessions for Rape. Found guilty. Sentenced to pay a fine of \$5, the costs of prosecution, and undergo an imprisonment of six months in the County Jail. Convict v. L. D. Ayers, Robt. Ayers and John M. Reeves—Indicted for Larceny at present sessions. Nolle prosequi entered as to John M. Reeves. A jury being called, Lorenzo D. Ayers withdrew his plea, and pleads guilty and nolle prosequi entered as to Robert Ayers.

CONVICTS.—Lorenzo D. Ayers sentenced to pay a fine of \$5, the costs of prosecution, and undergo an imprisonment in the Penitentiary for the term of one year and nine months. Convict v. Valeria Eilwal—Indicted at present sessions for Larceny. The jury found the defendant guilty. Sentenced to pay a fine of \$5, the costs of prosecution, and undergo an imprisonment in the Penitentiary for the term of one year and six months.

CONVICTS.—Geo. Johnson—Indicted at present sessions for passing fraudulent bank notes. Found guilty. Sentenced to pay a fine of \$5, the costs of prosecution, and undergo an imprisonment in the Penitentiary for the term of one year and six months.
