his domestic animals. To ascertain this, many resort to past experience, determining as nearly as they can guess -often by a very vague kind of guessing.-Those who have kept careful record of the number of tons consumed by a given head of cattle, or a certain number of horses, may determine more nearly. When the cattle and horses have been weighed, and the aggregate weight of the herd thus determined, the estimate may be made with considerable accuracy. Some animals eat more than others for the same weight ; a greater difference is occasioned by the severity or mildness of the weather, or the degree of shelter given from the cold : but as a general rule, a horse should have three per cent, of his own weight daily in food (hay or grain,) and cattle who digest better two and a half per cent. If the farme has ascertained the number of tons of fodder he has deposited in his bara, he may now, if he Plows, &c. understands arithmetic, determine pretty nearly how his bay is likely to run before grass time.

If he has no record of the amount of his hay, he may determine, very nerly by measuring. First, by finding the length, breadth, and depth of the hay, he at once knows the num-ber of cubic feet Good solid timothy, the average of a hay-mow 12 or 15 feet deep, will weigh a ton to about 500 cubic feet. If the hay is clover, it will require 600 to 650 for a ton; and if the hay is 5 or 6 feet deep, add one-sixth more.

After determining the number of tons, and the whole weight of all his animals, he may at once know if he has enough. The result will, however, be considerably modified by causes which he has more or less at his control. Regularity in feeding will have its influence ;good feeding-racks will prevent much wasteand comfortable shelter will save many tons to every large head. A skilful farmer informed us, that formerly, when he had just erected a fine new barn, with ample shelter of the best kind, he had learned, as he thought, according to his usual estimate, that he would have to buy hay to complete the wintering of his animals; but on trying his new sheds and stables so great was the saving actually effected, that he had several tons the next spring to spare. - Country Gent.

DECAY OF ROOFS .- There is nothing more unpleasant to the eye of an order-loving farmer than moss on his roof. Some folks, it is true, esteem it an ornament, but they are those who see wondrous beauty in moss-covered ruins, &c., (see last new novel,) but not so with the men who loves not only neatness, but who is desirous, on economical grounds, of preserying his roof to the longest possible period.—Our excellent neighbor, of the Working Farmer, has the following on the subject, which we commend to the attention of those who are about putting on new roofs : "There is a barn near our farm with a shin-

gle roof fifty years old, and the shingles appear quite as bright, and in as good order, as most shingle roofs at the of the first year .-When built, it was coated with a lime wash tinted with other, and fully charged with glue and salt. This formed an agreeable color, and lasted many years ; the lime present entirely preventing the growth of moss, and also the development of acetic acid, from any sappy portion of the shingles. About twenty years since, it was again re-coated, with the limewash tinted with umber. This is now pretty | public support. Particular attention given to re-binding Books. "We suppose that the lime alone put on as a whitewash, would have answered all these purposes, though not so agreeable to to the eye, while the wash tinted to resemble the color of the shingle, can never be unsightly."

HARNESS .- More damage is done to barness during the rainy weather of early and late winter than during all the rest of the year. Saturated with water, covered with mud, and often frozen stiff, so as to almost break when bent, in necessary handling unusual care should be taken to keep it well oiled and hung up in proper shape when not in use. Thus treated, it will not only last many times longer, but look infinitely better than when neglected in the usual manner.

As to the kind of oil, we know of nothing better than peat's foot, or the daubing used by tanners. To give the b'ack color characteristic to new leather, a little lampblack may be added, without detriment, though it is better not to use this until the second going over. Before putting on the oil, however, there

are two important conditions which must be observed-cleanliness and dampness. The necessity of the first is obvious, and the last is not less important, since the oil cannot penetrate the leather and make it soft and pliable if put on when it is dry and hard.

One of the best ways to give the leather the requisite degree of moisture is to wrap up the several parts of the harness in wet cloths a few hours previous to oiling. But this trouble is unnecessary where washing has been resorted to for cleaning, as the oil may then be applied before the leather is enirely dry. The oil sho'd be rubbed in briskly with a brush or cloth, so as to insure its absorbtion.

SAUCE FOR PUDDING .- Cream a half pound of butter, and stir in half a pound of brown sugar; after the butter is creamed, put the yolk of an egg into the sugar and butter ; add a gill of wine and put on the fire, stirring it all the while till it simmers; when it is sent in, grate a little natmeg over it.
