Saturday last, WASHINGTON's Birth was duly observed in this place. In the morning stars and stripes were hoisted in the most public place of town, giving our village a very patriotic appearance.

At 2 o'clock in the afternoon, the bells of the different churches and Court House were rung, and our citizens assembled at the Court House, where, according to pre-arrangement, WASHINGTON's Farewell Address was read.

The Court House was beautifully and appropriately decorated with flags and pictures, and densely crowded with people.

The meeting was organized by calling Hon. U. S. Marshall to the Chair. Upon taking the Chair Judge Marshall made a brief but pointed speech, which was frequently applauded. We will not attempt to review his speech, suffice it to say it was patriotic and appropriate to the occasion.

Mr. J. DUGLASS was then called upon and offered a prayer, invoking Divine aid in restoring our distressed country to peace and prosperity.

Ward, Esq., then came forward, and after a few preliminary remarks proceeded to read WASHINGTON's Farewell Address, which was duly read and well received by the audience.

After the reading of the Address a committee was appointed consisting of W. C. Bogart, William Ellwell, J. C. Adams, G. F. Mason, and B. S. Russell Esqs., to procure materials and to illuminate the Court House during the evening. It was also resolved that this meeting adjourn until evening.

There was a large attendance in the evening. The Court House was brilliantly illuminated, and the Court-room embellished with the glorious Stars and Stripes—Portraits of the "Father of his Country," and the great LAFAYETTE, and pictures of places and scenes associated with the times of these illustrious men, were conspicuous to remind us of their virtues, their patriotism, and their sacrifices in founding this great Union, which traitors with unwholly efforts are now attempting to destroy.

The illumination in front of the Court House, emblematic of the Rob, White, and Blue, elicited much praise, and reflects great credit upon J. F. Bender, Esq., who designed and prepared it. The meeting was presided over by the evening by Dr. Charles Turner, assisted by H. S. Mercer and Col. John F. Means as Vice Presidents.

Addresses were delivered by E. T. Elliott, Esq., Hon. U. S. Marshal, Col. John F. Means, Harry Ward, P. D. Morrow, C. L. Ward, Esq., and others, all eloquent and glowing with patriotic sentiments, and with three moving cheers for the Union and the Constitution the meeting passed off, all feeling grateful that we still have a country to love and a will and power to preserve it.

Tuition, per term, in advance, or one-half on entering the school, and one-half at the middle of the term—contingencies included. Primary, per term, \$4 00. Preparatory, per term, 6 00.

N. B. Pupils will be classed by the most advanced branch they respectively pursue. Pupils using scholarships are charged \$1 per term for fuel and contingents.

Washing, per dozen, 55. The Collegiate year is divided into three terms of 14 weeks each. The Anniversary exercises will be held at the close of the Spring term.

No deduction will be made for absence, except in case of protracted illness of more than two weeks. Instrumental Music will not, as heretofore, be taught in the Institute, but by special arrangement—a class will be taught in a hall adjoining the grounds of the Institute, by the Teacher of Vocal Music.

This arrangement has been adopted for the past term, and experience has proved it to be eminently superior to the plan pursued in former years. Special pains will be taken to secure the greatest progress of those wishing to take lessons in this branch.

Terms will be as heretofore: Tuition on Piano Forte, per term, \$10 00. Use of instrument on which to take lessons, 5 00. Pupils boarding in the Hall will furnish their own bed, and the table silver in their room. It is desirable that they should furnish their own bed and bedding when it is convenient, but when otherwise, these will be furnished at a slight charge.

It is strongly recommended that students from abroad should board in the Institute, as better opportunities for advancement in study are thereby secured. Normal Department—Special exercises are arranged without extra charge for those preparing themselves for Teachers of Common Schools.

Prof. C. R. COBURN, the able and well known Superintendent of Common Schools in the county, has kindly consented to organize the Teacher's class, and direct the course to be pursued. He will also be present to conduct the exercises as often as practicable, and will deliver frequent lectures on the Theory and Practice of Teaching, as also on other subjects connected with Normal training.

Those persons, therefore, intending to engage in teaching for the winter, will find it greatly to their advantage to be present during the Fall term. Prof. Coburn's connection with the Institute is not such as to in any way interfere with the discharge of the regular duties of his office.
