

LOCAL AND GENERAL.

Court convened on Monday last. The proceedings will appear next week. Navigation is now open on the North Branch Canal, and boats are making regular trips.

New Post Office.—A new Post office has been established at East Canton, this county, and WARREN LINDSON appointed postmaster.

Burned to Death.—A friend informs us that on Sunday last, a Mrs. ROCKWELL, of Canton, this county, was burned to death as a consequence of the explosion of a coal oil can, out of close proximity. Her husband who was present when the casualty occurred was also severely injured.

If April showers bring May flowers, a beautiful crop ought to be expected this month. The weather the past week has been changeable—wet, dry, warm and cool. The warm weather brought out the buds and blossoms of early bearing fruit trees, fortunately the cold was not severe enough to injure them.

The guns were loaded by his men, and handed up to him. It requires a great exercise of self-denial for the sharpshooters to allow him to exercise that kind of practice, but their orders were strict, and they could not fire. As the shots all fell short, no damage was done. Another of our pickets saw an exhibition of the delicate gallantry of the secessionist. One of the specimens mounted the picketworks, and after surveying our lines, turned her self about, at the same time giving her a scientific swing, displaying somewhat her neither legament, she then disappeared.

REGION OF TERROR.—We in the loyal States may well thank God for our comparatively happy condition in view of the desolations of the Rebel States. Thousands of farms in those States are now untenanted—not an acre sown—not a person or an animal on them—not a horse, cow, sheep or their best citizens have been robbed of all they had, and others compelled to flee to the North with what they could carry. Martial law is declared in and around many of the cities, and armed lawless desperadoes ravage as they choose. The military occupation is now resorted to, is positively terrible—worse than European despotism—so much so that some men fight to the death rather than be compelled to enlist, and others pay hundreds and thousands of dollars for "substitutes." Persons are compelled to take worthless Confederate money at par, and not allowed to discriminate between gold and specie. The hanging of Union men is threatened, and many are not merely plundered, mobbed, and imprisoned, but also murdered. To such straits has the folly of secessionists already brought their land! so justly are they already punished for their long years of tyranny over their colored fellow men!

THE WAR ENVELOPES.—The rage for envelopes decorated with patriotic or other embellishments is now subsiding rapidly. Letters travel without a protection of a flag, and portraits of distinguished persons, cease to occupy the corner opposite the physical address. Likenesses of Jeff. Davis and other eminent "secessionists," dancing jigs between heaven and earth are seen, and it is plain enough, as we have said, that the rage for envelopes is dying out. Various speculators, says the U. S. Mail, have accumulated a variety of specimens of these illustrated envelopes, and the time will doubtless come when such collections will be examined with the utmost interest by antiquarian desirous of getting a glimpse of the feeling and humor of our times, as they were displayed during the great civil war of the Western continent. What a remarkable jumble of patriotism, sentiments, humor and antiquity does such a collection present! Old letter and envelope are not only the memory of their writers, but for the historical and biographical matters which they contain. And even envelopes, their dry husks, which are considered a precious relic, become themselves fresh with vitality when they bear upon their faces marks of the feelings of a great nation. The modern writers of history, with more history, with more comprehensive views of the many of their predecessors, do not regard the life of a nation as consisting entirely in the intrigues of its rulers and their struggles for power, but consider the feeling of the people in their various relations, domestic, commercial, and the like, as of equal importance to the completion of the record.

THE FASHIONS.—A writer of the fashionable Journal of Commerce, says there has never been in Paris more diversity or more delicacy than is displayed in the moires and tafetas, which have appeared since the first of the new year. Some are embroidered and brocaded with shaped flowers and leaves; others have small stripes or cross bars. The satins silks are covered with small spots, not larger than the head of a pin; white silks are satins with white, black and scarlet; black silks are white, and violet with gold. Mottos and mottoes in color is brogaded with branches of flowers; some color is encircled with a narrow black line, giving the appearance of being raised, as a cameo. The latest style of moire is of a white ground, with pink flowers brocaded in the material, the leaves being embroidered in black. Taletans, crapes and tules are the fashions and trines or black Chantilly lace, others of white point d'Angleterre and point d'Bruxelles, the designs representing garlands of fruit and flowers, scroll arabesque festoons and Algerian patterns of endless variety.
