Normal Department.—Special exercises are arranged without extra charge for those preparing themselves as Teachers of Common Schools. Prof. C. T. COBURN, the able and well known Superintendent of Common Schools in the county, has kindly consented to organize the Teacher's class, and direct the course to be pursued. He will also be present to conduct the exercises as often as practicable, and will deliver frequent lectures on the Theory and Practice of Teaching, as also on other subjects connected with Normal training.

Those persons, therefore, intending to engage in teaching for the winter, will find it greatly to their advantage to be present during the Fall term.

Prof. Coburn's connection with the Institution is not such as to in any way interfere with the discharge of his regular duties of his office.
