As there was to be no public demonstration in town, a picnic and ball and excursion on the Barclay Road was announced, which was very agreeably responded to.—A ball was given from the Park, under the supervision of Mr. JOHN F. BROWN, took place in the afternoon, which attracted a large crowd, and was a very successful operation.

EUGENE C. VANDYKE, son of DAVID VANDYKE, was wounded while on picket duty near Fair Oaks, Va., on the 16th ult., by a minnie ball, in the thigh.—The ball penetrated the flesh a little above the middle way of the right thigh, striking the bone, glancing down about four inches, lodging in the skin on the outside, a little above the knee, and was taken out by the surgeon. At last accounts he was likely to recover, without the loss of his limb. He belonged to the 106 Reg., P. V.

A meeting of the members of Company E, 124 Reg. P. V., was held near the battle field of Fair Oaks, Va., on Sunday, June 1, 1862, to form resolutions expressive of their regret at the death of their brother and fellow soldier, THOMAS G. BEVIN, who fell on the bloody battle field of Fair Oaks, May 31st. Lieut. H. A. WOOD was chosen Chairman, and S. A. BUNYAN, Secretary.

A Committee constituted of Sergeant H. D. WOOD, A. M. HAIGHT and W. C. MAY were appointed to draft resolutions. The following were submitted and unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That we have placed Almighty God to call from among us our brother and fellow soldier, patriot and companion, THOMAS G. BEVIN, therefore be it

Resolved, That in this visitation from Heaven, we recognize the hand of the Almighty, and the will of Him who doeth all things well.

Resolved, That in the death of our brother, our Company has lost one of its most worthy members, and the Union a true and gallant patriot.

Resolved, That as soldiers, we bear testimony to the integrity of his character, his soldierly conduct, industry and faithfulness in the discharge of his onerous duties, his warm and generous affection, and the intimacy which marked his intercourse with his fellow-men and soldiers.

Resolved, That we deeply sympathize with the sorrowful parents and friends of our deceased brother.

Resolved, That the members of Co. E, attend him to his last resting place, in a body.

Resolved, That a copy of these resolutions be transmitted to the Chairman to the family of the deceased, and to the editors of the Bradford County papers, for publication.

SURGICAL OPERATIONS.—We take the following from the Elmira Daily Gazette, of the 21st ult: "A correspondent gives an account of two surgical operations, as performed by Dr. E. P. ALLEN, of East Smithfield, Bradford county, Pa. Both cases were of an exceedingly difficult and delicate character, and therefore demanded the greatest professional skill on the part of the operator, and it appears that both were most successfully treated. The Doctor is spoken of as having had a large practice, and as a careful and skillful operator. The cases, and as treated, are as follows:

AMPUTATION AT THE HIP JOINT. On 18th inst., Dr. E. P. ALLEN, of East Smithfield, Bradford county, Pa., assisted by Drs. COREY, WILSON, GRENOLD and MOODY, amputated the leg of Geo. DAVIS, at the hip joint. The Doctor remarked before operating that the patient had been afflicted eight years, and the excruciating pain and profuse discharge had made him very feeble. The amputation had been recommended to him a long time ago, and it was now a general resort; yet from the success he had in a similar case one year and a half ago, he had reason to hope the operation would prove a successful one. After the operation the head of the bone was found to be entirely ulcerated away, and a part of the trochanter major. The socket (acetabulum) was ulcerated through to the size of a quarter of a dollar. All the diseased portion of the bone were removed, and the patient in less than forty-eight hours after the operation was walking well.

REMOVAL OF THE UPPER EYE-LID FOR CANCER. Mrs. G., aged seventy three years, had been suffering twelve years from a cancerous growth on the upper lid of the right eye. For a year past she had suffered great pain in the eye and head, owing to pressure of the tumor on the eye, entirely excluding the globe from sight, and the pressure on the nerves in that region. The Doctor said a radical cure could hardly be expected on a patient of her years, yet it was not impossible. The primary object was to remove the tumor so as to relieve the parts from the great pressure in which they were suffering. After which, he removed the entire lid, and quite a prominence in the inner canthus. The patient was quite comfortable after the operation. Both patients were thoroughly under the anæsthetic influence of chloroform.
