DRAFTING .- Special instructions have been received by me requiring notice to be given that the draft will be made of the 15th day of September, 1862, for the number of men to fill the quota for each district,

unless the district furnishes the men as Volunteers before that day; but in case the appeals could not be finished by that time, the Governor might extend the time; but the extension would not exceed five days, which will be the 20th. Each district (Township or Borough), can offer volunteers to the Commissioner at any time before that day to make up their quota, and thereby obviate the draft entirely. But we are not authorized to subsist them

until the day of the draft. As the sudden call for volunteers and Militia, has ex hausted the supply of blankets fit for military purposes in the market, and it will take some time to procure, by manufacture or importation, a sufficient supply, all citizens who may volunteer, or be drafted, are advised to take with them to the fendezvous, if possible, a good stout woolen blanket. The regulation military blanket is 84 X 66 inches, and weighs five pounds.
