The draft is enforced under an act of Congress of July 17 1862, which provides, among other things, that " the President is authorized to make all necessary rules and regulctions in cases where State laws are defective as to the enrolment or execution of the draft. An act of Assembly of Pennsylvania, passed in 1822, (65th section, April

2d.) provides as follows:

"Each and every * * * private of the militia who shall have neglected or refused to serve when called into active service in pursuance of an order or requisition of the President of the United States, shall be hable to the penalties defined in the act of Congress of February 28th 1795, or any other acts that may thereafter be passed. On reference to the act of Congress referred to, it will

be found to embrace the following points :-" Every officer, non-commissioned officer, or private of "Every officer, non-commissioned officer, or private of the militia, who shall fail to obey the orders of the President of the United States * * * shall forfeit a sum not exceeding one year's pay, and not less than one month's pay, to be determined and adjudged by a courtmatial * * * and such none commissioned officers and privates shall be liable to be imprisoned by a like sentence, on failure of payment of the fines adjudged against them, for one calendar month for every five dollars of such fine."
