was taken up for consideration. Dr. Tracy, after making a few remarks upon the pathology of the disease, said that the disease, as it had come under his observation, was Asthenic, and the treatment should accordingly be supporting, the patient should be kept up with iron, quinine and stimulents .-The best application to the membranous exudation in his hands was Nitrate of Silver. He also recommended the use of Chlorate of Potash, when there was any fætor of

Dr. Rockwell coincides with Dr. Tracy that the treatment should be supporting. He opens the bowels in the beginning, then gives Tr. of Iron-sometimes with it he gives Quinine. He mixes calomel with honey and applies to the exudation in the throat; sometimes he uses the Tr. of Iron, also the Chloride of Zinc in the throat, as hey are indicated. If the membrane extends to the largux he vomits with an infusion of Sanguiaria. He larynx he vomits with an infusion of Sanguinaria. He also gives internally milk punch, or other stimulents,

Dr. Smith considers that applications to the membrane do no good-treatment should be instituted to make the parts healthy which secrete the membrane. We should give alteratives; we should begin with an emetic of Sul-Phate of Zinc and Ipecac afterwards give Carbonate of Ammonia, also Calomel. Late in the disease it may be Well to give quinine. If the throat require washing, the

Sulphate of Zinc may be used. Dr. Parsons believes that Tartar Emetic should be given some times, also Calomel-in each case treat it as the symptoms indicate; iron is good, so is ipecae; in some Oct. 22, 1862.
