Fire.—The dwelling house of JOHN BAXON, of Whitom township, was destroyed by fire about midnight of December last. Mr. BAXON and his wife, together with Mrs. McCARTHY, were away from home, and on a night they sent a boy about six years old to make up the fire, which he did and went away, and soon afterwards was seen to be in flames. Everything was consumed. Mrs. McCARTHY, who is the wife of a soldier, residing with Mr. BAXON, who has every thing she had. On the night of the 13th, the residence of Mr. PATRICK BROWN and JOHN KILLBERRY, of Whitom township, took fire from a stove-pipe and was consumed, together with most of what it contained. Mrs. BROWN was away from home, and the fire originated in her part of the house, which was locked, so that little could be re- moved.

On motion of Dr. Horton, the reading of the minutes of the last meeting was dispensed with. The President then called for the reading of Reports of Cases.

Dr. Horton, reported a case of Rupture of the Heart in a soldier, the result of enormously distending the stomach with food—having eaten seven large dishes of oys- ters at one meal, just prior to the accident.
