

LOCAL AND GENERAL.

OUR CANALS.—The following is an exhibit of the earnings of the canals for the past year. The earnings of the company's canals were: from the Susquehanna division, \$293,539.09; Juniata division, \$23,142.29; Western division, \$8,801.92; miscellaneous sources, \$15,998.26; total earnings, \$341,481.56.

SUPERINTENDENTS OF COMMON SCHOOLS.—A bill is pending in the Legislature which repeals the act now in force relating to county superintendents of common schools.

BISHOP POTTER, of the Diocese of Pennsylvania, has issued an address to the clergy and congregations in behalf of the Missionaries of the Diocese, and in conclusion recommends that collections be made in every congregation on Sunday, Feb. 15th, for missions within the diocese, and that they be transmitted to the Treasurer, James S. Biddle, Esq., of Philadelphia.

PRINTERS TO TAXID, first, as dealers, \$19 per annum; secondly, on paper 3 per cent ad valorem; thirdly on ink; fourthly on type; fifthly on their income, which consists principally of expenses; and lastly and worst of all, they have to pay double price for paper, and for everything they eat, drink or wear.

Should the issue of paper money increase as rapidly for the next six months as it has done during the past twelve, we may see a return of the time spoken of by Deacon Witherspoon, one of the signers of the Declaration, when creditors were seen running away and their debtors pursuing them in triumph, and paying them without mercy.

IMPORTANT TO SCHOOL DIRECTORS.—The attention of School Directors is invited to the following section of the common school law passed last winter, in relation to their duties: 'That it shall be the duty of the board of directors in each school district to publish an annual statement of the amount of money received and expended and the amount due from collectors, and setting forth all the financial operations of the district in not less than ten written or printed hand bills, to be put up in the most public places in the district.'
