LOCUSTS COMING.—The locust tribe will be on hand this year—as 1862 is the seventeenth year since their last appearance. From notes taken at the following dates we learn that these locusts made their appearance on the wing, May 10th, 1846; on the 22nd commenced singing; on the 31st commenced boring trees and laying eggs. On June 6th they commenced dying, the males first—and by the 25th of the same month they were all dead.

The Harrisburg Telegraph says that "We are authorized to state in explanation of certain rumors, which have been put in circulation, to the effect that Governor Curtin was engaged with other individuals living in Washington city, in a great conservative movement," that the report is without foundation in fact. Governor Curtin is engaged, politically, in no other movement but that which tends to the consolidation and strengthening of the Republican party—a consolidation which seeks to embrace the entire Union sentiment of the country.

THE LENTEN SEASON.—The season of Lent commences earlier than usual this year. Ash Wednesday is the first day, falling upon the 18th. Ash Wednesday is one of the most solemn feasts of the Christian year, and is observed with great strictness in the Catholic Church. It is also observed, but with less strictness, in the Episcopal Church. Adult Catholics are limited to a single meal and a collation on Ash Wednesday. The use of fresh meat is also prohibited, and all who can possibly do so are required to pass part of the day in church, to observe the ashes. The Lenten season extends from Ash Wednesday to Easter Sunday, and during its continuance the Catholic Church requires its members to observe a strict fast, and also to devote more time than usual to their religious duties.

Frost Bite.—In a late number of the British American Journal, there is an article by Dr. Bell on the treatment of frost bite. His own plan, which he says, has been approved by a large experience, is after applying cold water or snow for a few minutes, to immerse the frozen part in warm water containing a sufficient quantity of ground pepper or mustard; as one of the articles is to be found in almost every household, it is consequently always available. If portions of the hot liquid are to be applied, and frequently repeated until circulation is restored. In a few minutes a stinging sensation will be felt; and in a short time, vitality will be restored, unless the frost has penetrated too deeply. If the whole thickness of a member was frozen, immersion the principal blood-vessels and bone, so treatment can restore vitality.
