His own plan which, he says, has been approved by a large experience, is, after applying cold water or snow for a few minutes, immerse the frozen part in warm water containing s sufficient quanty of ground pepper or mustard; as one or the other of those articles is to be found in almost ev house, it is consequently always available. If portions of the ears or face are affected, pieces of flannel coming out of the hot liquid are to be applied and frequently repeated until cir culation is restored. In a few minutes a tingling sensation will be felt; and in a short time, ritality will be restored, unless the frost has penetrated too deeply. If the whole thickness of a member was ozen, including the principal blood-vessels and bone, no treatment can rest ore vitality.
