The provost marshal is instructed to act under this order and take from citizens any portion of the uniform or buttons of the latter, by H. E. Whitney, C. B. STRAIT and IDA L. GOODRICH: United States army which they may wear in public. It s well that these facts should be known.

THE DRAFT - Excitement may be expected in all sections of the country, on the subject of a draft. It is a forgone conclusion that for the prosecution of the war another army must be raised, and a very large one too. It is known that in May and June next, the time of the enlistment of about two-thirds of the present army will have expired, and it is not supposed that a very large number of those now in the fanks will re-enlist.
