Com. vs. Samuel Rorabaugh.—Indicted for Larceny at present sessions. The evidence showed that on the 3d of April last, Alvin W. Thomas laid down his wallet in the post office in Troy, and presently discovered that it had been taken by some person. Suspicion attached to Rorabaugh, and after search the wallet containing all the money, \$19, was found in a wood pile in the rear of the Presbyterian Church. Jury found Rorabaugh guilty, and he was sentenced to undergo an imprisonment of one year in the Penitentiary.

Com. vs. Ephraim Hester.—Defendant was indicted for Larceny at present sessions. He was in the employ of J. W. Whitman, of Monroe township, and in the absence of Mr. W. and family, skidded with sundry articles of clothing and a shot gun. Jury found him guilty, and Court sentenced him to an imprisonment in the Penitentiary for one year and four months.

Com. vs. Amos Ray.—Indicted at present sessions for the larceny of a pair of boots and an overcoat, the property of Hiram Horton. Defendant pleaded guilty, and was sentenced to one year's imprisonment in the Penitentiary.

Com. vs. Jefferson Beales.—Defendant was indicted at present sessions for taking one turkey, the property of Robert Bennett, of Canton township, on the 1st of April last. Jury found him guilty, and Court sentenced him to a fine of \$5, costs of prosecution, and undergo an imprisonment of thirty days in the County Jail.

Com. vs. Thomas Mobery.—Defendant was indicted for entering the office of G. D. Montanye, in this borough, and stealing sundry Bono's and Poor orders. He pleaded guilty, and was adjudged by the Court to be a fit subject for the House of Delegates.

Com. vs. John Carr.—Surety of the Peace, in having threatened Michael Donahue, of Wyalusing township. After hearing defendant is ordered to enter into bonds to keep the peace, &c., in default of which he was committed to jail.

Com. vs. John Desmond, Jr.—Indicted for assault and battery upon Dennis Cain. Defendant pleaded guilty, and was sentenced to pay a fine of \$20, costs of prosecution, and undergo an imprisonment of ten days in the County Jail.

Com. vs. Ralph Martin.—Indicted at September sessions for selling liquor without license. Defendant pleaded guilty, and was sentenced to pay a fine of \$20, and costs of prosecution.

Com. vs. Horace Diamond.—Assault and battery upon E. C. Williams, of Troy borough. Being arraigned, defendant pleaded guilty, and was sentenced to pay a fine of \$15, and costs of prosecution.

Com. vs. Susan Carr.—Indicted at February session for larceny. Defendant pleaded guilty, and was sentenced to pay a fine of \$5 and costs, and undergo an imprisonment of sixty days in the County Jail.

Com. vs. Ellen Clancy.—Indicted for selling liquor without license, and also on Sunday, on the return of the Constable of Wysox township. Defendant pleaded guilty, and was sentenced upon the first indictment, to pay a fine of \$10 and costs—upon the second to pay a fine of \$10 and costs, and undergo an imprisonment of ten days in the County Jail.

Com. vs. John Kendall.—Indicted for selling liquor on Sunday and also to minors, &c. Defendant pleaded not guilty, and the jury found him (in both cases) not guilty, but to pay the costs.

No deduction will be made for absence, except in case of protracted illness of over two weeks. Pupils boarding in the hall will furnish their own towels, and the table silver, at their option. It is desirable that they also furnish their own bed and bedding when it is convenient, but when otherwise, these will be furnished at a slight charge. It is strongly recommended that students from abroad should board in the Institution, as better opportunities for advancement in study are thereby secured.

Normal Department.—Special exercises are arranged as Teachers of Common Schools. Prof. C. R. COBURN, the able and well known Superintendent of Common Schools in the county, has kindly consented to organize the Teacher's class, and direct the course to be pursued. He will also be present to conduct the exercises as often as practicable, and will deliver frequent lectures on the Theory and Practice of Teaching, as also on other subjects connected with Normal Training.

Those persons, therefore, intending to engage in teaching for the winter, will find it greatly to their advantage to be present during the Fall term. Prof. Coburn's connection with the Institution is not such as to in any way interfere with the discharge of the regular duties of his office, and his presence in the Normal Room will be spared, on the part of the Faculty or Trustees in sustaining the high reputation the Institution has hitherto enjoyed, and in rendering it more worthy of future patronage and aid.
