He was wounded at the battle of Chancel lorsville, on Sunday morning, May 3d, by a minnie ball, which entered the right breast, passing through the up shoulder-blade against which it lodged, and was extract ed when his wound was first dressed. When wounded Col. W. was taken to a log house, near the battle-field, as supposed in a dying condition. This house was soon in possession of the rebels, and was atterwards in the range of our shells, many of which passed through the house killing some of the wounded.

Col. W had the good fortune to fall into the hands of Dr. Breckinridge and the Medical Director of the rebel army, who dressed his wounds, and afterwards cared for him. To their attention he is undoubtedly indebted for his life. He is now doing well, and will unquestionably recover from the effects of his injury.
