their most violent enmity. Since his connection with the army he had been unable to visit his house without a military escort, and his premises have often been visited by the gaerrillas in search of him and his property caried off.

Shortly after the breaking out of the reb ellion in 1861. he was fired upon by a secessionist, the ball passing RICHMOND TAKEN ! through his arm near the shoulder. He came to Pa. for safety, and after 3 months absence returned to No. and joined the Union army. The Federal and Confederate armies have alternately quartered on his farm, and his improvements--fences, &c., have been destroyed. Very recklessly he had visited his home alone, and accompanied by his boy, 14 years old, he set out on his return to camp and when the boy found him after the pursuit, life was extinct and the rebels were hurrying off with his empty horse. Awful sight for a boy to witness ! He was the oldest son of Mr. DANIEL DURAND, of Herrick township, in this county. This is only another item among those that are now so sadly realized in thousands of homes all over the land.


