DIGGING MACHINE.—We find in the Scientific American, the following notice of a steam digging machine, lately patented by CHARLES H. STRATTON, of Monroeville:— "This invention relates to a new and improved machine for digging the earth, with steam as a motor, and it consists in the employment or use of spoked forks of any suitable or desirable number, arranged in such a manner that they will, as the machine is drawn along, penetrate the earth and lift and turn over the same, similarly to hand digging, and perform the work equally as well."
