Directors are required by law to

visit the schools once a month" and 'record the results" for future reference, and to guide the action of the board. It is a fact that comparatively few of our schools receive that systematic visitation which the law contemplates. Our late State Superintendent says truly that "no duty of the Director can be more beneficial to the schools than the one here It is, however, seldom "well done," and frequently not done at all. Directors excuse themselves with the remark that they get no pay for their time, and cannot afford it. But the law provides that the Secretary may do this duty for them, and be paid never be what they ought to be so long as the majority manifest so little interest in them. There should be a stronger sympathy between patrons and teacher-a feeling that their interests are common interests. Frequent visitation of the schools by parents and Directors would prove of incalculable advantage to all conon trial, though your probation must cerned. They are the legal employers of teachers. How else, than by inspecting the work, can they know that those they employ are faithful to their trust?
