JOHN HOLLENBACK, Esq., died at his residence in Wyalusing, March 13th, 1867, in the ninety-second year of his age.

Mr. HOLLENBACK was born in Martinsburg, Va., Nov. 14, 1775, a subject, though a rebellious one, of his majesty King George III. In 1783, after the declaration of peace, his parents joined in the sudden tide of emigration to the westward, and settled at Morgantown, on the Monongahela River, West Virginia; now talked of as the future sapital of that new State. Ten years later he left that place and came to Wilkes-Barre where he had relatives; which place was his home until his final removal to Wyalu-

Pending the present movement to restore the shad to our upper waters, it is interesting to know that in the year 1797 he came shad-fishery; and that he soon after returned to Wilkes-Barre after a successful experiment, with his boat heavily laden with the salted shad.

In the year 1801 he removed to Wyalusing, coming up the river in a canoe, with a small stock of goods for purposes of trade: which was the beginning of a trade of a considerable extent carried on for many years at various points in the valley.
