Onions and Poultry.—Scarcely too much can be said in praise of onions for fowls. They seem to be a preventive and remedy for various diseases to which domestic fowls are liable. Having frequently tested their exellencies, we can speak understandingly. For gaps and inflammation of the throat, eyes and head, onions are almost a specific. We would, therefore, recommend giving fowls, and especially young chickens as many as they will eat, as often as twice or three times a week. They should be finely chopped. A small addition of corn meal is an improvement.
