WILCOX.—In Franklin, Bradford Co. Pa., July 27th, 1866, Gates Wilcox, in the 70th year of his age. He was born Sept 21st, 1796, in eastern Rhode Island. He was very extensively known, having lived in a great many different places. From Rhode Island he accompanied his father to Chenango Co. N. Y. in 1816 and settled on a farm. For a number of years that occupation interested his mind. But after while he commenced a more public business as mill builder, and during his life built twenty one mills and several other factories. He was one of the most thorough-going and energetic men of the age.—He was Superintendent of the poor house in Chenango Co., three years, but the most of his life was spent in mill building, and Pennsylvania will long enjoy the benefit of his skill in that line, as most of them were built in its pine forests, and many of them are yet in operation along the West Branch, from the mouth of the Loyal-Stock up to Youngmans-town; also the Pine Creek lumber region has very many visible marks of his industry: And too Wellsboro, Tioga Co. can speak of his early intelligence. It may also be remembered that the great booming plan for holding logs in the rapid West Branch was put on foot by him; and perhaps we can safely say that there is not a mountain along the West Branch and Pine Creek range that he did not explore. Always resolute and determined, he generally succeeded in whatever he undertook, and though failing in some instances he would try again, and thus he became victor. In his life he blessed a large family, having

married three times, leaving two children by his widow Mrs. Wilcox, in Franklin. He passed his last days on the farm known as the Hawley place. His character as a citizen was one of the most noble, kind, and generous hearted especially to the poor.—He said that he never designedly wronged a person. He was a good farmer, a peaceable man, a fine neighbor, a true Republican Patriot, hating everything pro-slavery in its nature; and when Abraham Lincoln fell he wept like a child.

As a Christian, he made a public profession of religion in his early manhood, and during his last illness (which was very protracted) he was one of the most patient uncomplaining and resigned men that I ever saw, giving good evidence that he was possessed of those sustaining virtues of the Christian religion, and was frequently heard to say that to him the future looked bright—and we trust he is now at rest.

His labors done securely laid. In the last long rest. Uncheered o'er the silent dust. Yet not thus lifeless in the grave. The vital spark shall lie; For o'er his face that spark shall rise, To seek its kindred sky. E. B.
