—Louis Napoleon gave a state dinner in honor of Admiral Farragut.

—The remaining portion of Table Rock, Niagara Falls, was blown away on Friday of last week, by a 20 lb. blast of powder.

—Sergeant John Lynch, a Fenian, died in Buffalo, on Saturday last, from wounds received at Ridgeway, while invading Canada.

—A man has been held to bail, in Detroit, for smuggling two barrels of crude oil from Canada. He poured the contents into a well, and sold oil land enough to make himself rich.

—The "democrats" of Alabama have called a state convention to meet at Montgomery, on the first Tuesday in September. They urge a union of all colors and races on the "Conservative" platform.

—The czar has issued a decree by which the whole territory lately conquered by the Russian forces in Central Asia, is constituted one government, under the command of General Kaufman.

—The directors of the Erie Railroad have decided to build a depot at Elmira this fall, at a cost of \$28,000.

—A street brawl between two deaf mutes, occurred at Lewiston, Me., a few days ago. As they talked with their fingers the town was not disturbed. They received sundry blows and kicks in silence.

—Wm. Howard Barnum, teller of the Pequot National Bank of Bridgeport, Conn., has decamped with several thousand dollars of the bank's money.

—On the 25th, ult., a shooting affair occurred in Frankfort, Ky., in which Tom. Bridgford shot James Nichols dead. The former was dangerously wounded.

—Robert Henry Hendershot, "the drummer boy of the Esplanade," now holds a position as conductor on the Union Pacific railroad. His young wife, with whom he lately eloped from Poughkeepsie, is in Omaha, and has made quite a sensation in that city.

—Rev. Henry Ward Beecher delivered a sermon in Plymouth church, Brooklyn, Sunday evening, on "The Nobility of Labor," in which he said that more public men of eminence had started from the business of type setting than probably from any other occupation.
