

1. As the pastures become short and dry, your stock will betray symptoms of uncleanliness. Some will pine, some will be ill-tempered, and some will become unruly. The way to remedy this is to increase the supply of food. This may be effected indirectly by selling off a part of your stock...

2. Be very careful to preserve specimens of all new growing fruits, especially from young trees. We know some persons who have had orchards bearing several years, and who, after all, have discovered this year, for the first time, how valuable some kinds of their fruit were...

3. Repair all leaky places in roofs; if it is all open spots in the sides of barns and sheds and provide good shelter for stock, before the heavy autumn storms occur.

4. The autumn is the best time for painting all wood that needs this protection. Paint, therefore, soon, all fences, posts, gates, sheds and buildings that need painting, whether new or old.

5. A few days since we saw a hayrick, several plows, a horse, a cart, some ox yokes and a narrow wagon lying out of doors. They were baking in the sun, and cracking open with exposure. Near by them was plenty of room to keep them all under good shelter.

6. Of weeds we have had an extra number and a most luxuriant growth during the present year. Some weeks ago we solicited attention to this fact, and to the necessity growing out of it for extra exertions to grub them and prevent them from going to seed.

7. As a large proportion of the farmers are very careless in regard to the eradication of weeds, and as such carelessness will be more productive of mischief this year than it usually is, it may not be worth the supererogation to call attention to the subject once more.

8. If it is not yet too late to mow down or pull up these weeds, and to place them in piles either for burning or for fermentation. Much better will it be, at all events, to get rid of all weed seeds not yet scattered by winds, birds, &c., even at this late period, than to give them any additional opportunity for dissemination.

9. Thousands of these seeds may yet be destroyed in gardens and fields. Let the standing weed be cut down and collected into piles, so as to be burned or rotted, for which latter purpose the corners of fences, where there are any worm fences still in existence, or other waste places will be the most appropriate.

10. If not at year, then at least the year after, the weeds will be cut down and some of them used as manure, and all danger from the seeds either entirely or very nearly at an end.

11. Calves "Brought up by Hand." A member of the Circuiter Farmers' Club makes a specialty of rearing calves, and has read a paper before the Association describing his experience.

12. They have for the first three or four days two or three quarts of milk at a meal; then gradually some food in the shape of gruel is added, and by degrees water is substituted for milk.

13. Mixing oil cake with gruel is the great secret of success. I use half oil cake, the best I can get, and a large bucket capacity of holding six gallons, put into two gallons of scalding water; then add seven pounds of linseed cake, finely ground, which is obtained by collecting the dust that falls through the screen of the crusher, and passing it through one of Turner's mills.

14. The hay tea made by pouring scalding water in the morning on good sweet hay, in a tub, the tea standing covered till night, and having seven pounds of meal (wheat, barley and beans mixed) stirred into a tubful before use. The same hay will bear a second infusion during the night, for the purpose of thickening the quart pail, with an equal amount of cold water, is enough for a feed.

15. The old plan of letting them suck through the cowman's fingers is preferred, and, as soon as they can eat, crushed corn, sweet hay, and roots are placed within reach; and as soon as they are ready, and mangolds, of which a supply should always be stored if practicable. The calves live in a cool, well ventilated house, are kept very clean and quiet, supplied with fresh water daily, and the manure frequently removed.

16. All along the coast of New Jersey, coral, composed largely of phosphatic and siliceous matter, is forming so rapidly as to threaten interruption to navigation in some places. Being an excellent fertilizer, it is being collected with strong forks and grapples; and in many instances the deposits are so large and heavy that they cannot be lifted to the surface.

17. By passing the entire mass through a crushing machine everything is reduced to small fragments. At the same time a liberal amount of dry muck is mingled with the coral for the purpose of absorbing the ammoniacal material, and thus retained it until the compost can be applied to the soil.

18. The new fertilizer promises to be a source of rich revenue to the State.
