Soreowful Tragedy .- On Saturday, 17th inst, our quiet village was the scene of one of those tracedies in real life which lectrify communities and overshadow families with a voiceless sorrow. The unhappy woman lingered in great agony until late in the forenoon, when

death came to her relief. Miss Tremain was in full possession of her faculties up to the last, and in response to questions uniformly leglared that the act was contemplated, and entirely volun tary. A letter addressed to her mother. found under her pillow, written chiefly two days pravious, stated that she had nothing to live for, and sought death as a relief from life's burden.
