BURNED TO DEATH .- Mrs. Pendleton, of Windham, Pa., (daughter of Samuel Shoemaker,) married about one year ago, returned from church on last Sunday week, started a fire, and was in the act of removing a lid from the top of the stove, when the dame burst up, setting fire to her clothes, and burning her flesh to a crisp before her husband, attracted by her screams, reached the room and succeeded in extinguishing the fire. She lived in great agony some lead. It is recommended by the Croton Board of New York, and by the Water Boards and Physicians of all the principal twenty four hours when death put an end to her sufferings.

FIRE IN BROOKFIELD .- At midnight of Monday, 12th inst., the large barn owned by Mr. H. B. Seeley, of Brookfield, was discovered to be pu fire, and in a short time was utterly consumed, with about 350 bushels of winter wheat, 15 tons of hay, and farming preusils stored therein. Of a yoke of oven in the stables, one was burned, the incendiary cut the strap of the one that escaped. There seems to be no doubt that the fire was by design. Mr. Seeley's loss is about \$1,200. Serious Accident,-We learn that on the afternoon of the 21st inst., Thomas Snell started from the saw mill of his brother, at Elk Creek, this county, with a team of young and partially broke horses, hitched to a loaded wagon. He had gone' but a slypt distance when the horses became frightened and ran away, throwing Mr Snell from the wagon, the wheels passing over and mangling him in a shocking manner. At last accounts he was in a precarious condition, and his life despaired of .-Sullivan Free Press.

MASSACRE AMONG SNAKES.—On Friday, the 23d inst., D. T. Wise, Esq., of Trout Run, while in search of a flock of sheep, on the mountain, about one mile from the village, was startled by the rattling of a monster snake, and seeing to his surof a monster snake, and seeing, to his surprise, that he was surrounded by the poisonous reptiles, he commenced the massacre by shooting. He fired four times, which started them toward their den; then seizing Bradford. a stout cudgel he finished the escaping snakes. Upon gathering together and coun ting them, they amounted to fifty-two killed. He then left on his journey, and marked the spot to visit on his return, or at some future day. Two days afterwards he returned, accompanied by his brother, S. L. Wise, and T. A. Brees. Arriving at the den they discovered a monster copperhead snake lying at his content over the entrance of the den. Killing him caused a buzzing noise among the rocks, and the party commenced removing the stones, finding and killing six more coppris ade, eight rattle, and three black snakes; killing in all sixty rattle, seven copper and three black spakes sum total seventy snakes .- Williamsport Bulletin .
