The case of entrooion was that of a poor Irish domestic, who had lost the sight of one eye, and the disease was fast depriving her of the sight of the other, of which she was happily relieved by an operation of snipping out a piece of skin just beneath the eye lid, and bringing the walls of the wound together. This drew out the under lid of the eye, the eye lashes upon which had previously been rubbing against the surface of the eye, causing constant inflamation of that organ, and forming the disease called entropion.
