Agricultural. Agricultural Capital.

What in the hands of the farmer constitutes capital? With the merchant, cash is capital; with the land speculator, land is capital; with the farmer, cash, land and stock are "capital. Nor do these constitute al a farmer's capital-many other items, too often overlooked, also form capi tal, such as implements, manure, and, most of all, labor.

Capital is either productive or nonproductive; a million of dollars in gold or silver, or one thousand acres of unproductive land may be capital, but while it remains in this state it To select from than is kept in acy other Furth produces nothing and the owner may ture Store in this region; but also by offering them. be actually growing poorer.

Increase in wealth does not depend so much upon the amount of capital as upon the use made of it; and in nothing is this more plainly shown than in farming.

There is many a farmer who commenced on fifty acres; on this he auunally expended twenty per cent, in manure, labor, &c., &c., and the produce was perhaps forty per cent. Encouraged by this success, he adds fifty acres more, but he does not proportionally increase his active capital. and the profits are lessened in proportion. Still he has not land enough and buys more, still adding very little or nothing to his active capital.-The consequence is that while on fifty acres he made forty per cent. on five hundred he would realize nothing.—
He has converted his productive into OF EVERYTHING IN THE LINE, non-productive capital.

There is nothing more true than that the inordinate desire for large farms has been the ruin of thousands. It is true that a large farm may be made as productive as a small one but to do this there must be expended in it an amount of active capital, in the shape of manure, labor, &c., in proportion—a thing rarely done. Let no one undertake to have or hold more land than he has capital to

ran ge well. We'll hear a certain class of farmers (so called) say they are "too poor to buy lime," "too poor to buy cattle," to make mature. These are tre kind who have too much land .-Sa to a farmer, holding or e hundred acres, would find it more profitable to dispose of fitty, and expend the proceeds as active capital on the remaining half.

A western writer has said that "large tarms are the curse of the west "k nor does this apply to the west alone, but also to the east. By increasing the depth of his soil the farmer increases his crops, without increasing his number of acres, and with little or no extra expense in

Spare the Trees .- There is yet, all

over the country, and particularly in the West, except upon the prairies, where necessity has been a teacher, too great a disposition to cut down trees-truit trees as well as forest trees—with too much recklessness Bady-made Coffins constantly on hand or and disregard to future profit, comtrees-with too much recklessness fort or elegance. Let every farmer resolve forthwith, if he has not already done so, to commence saving all the trees that are of any value, that he can, by a fair calculation, estimate to be worth more standing and - growing than if cut down. Let this apply to trees in the forest, as well as forest or fruit trees along the line of his fences. As a general rule it is better to have fruit trees in an orchard, where they can be watched, and where depredations are not so likely to be made, if the farm be located Rear a city or village; but when they have attained a size too great for convenient removal, they may often advantageously be left to stand in the field, especially if along a fence

where the shade is not so much of an objection. It will not only be profitable to allow the trees to stand, but where time can be found, it will pay well to transplant trees along the fences. A very valuable tree for this purpose is the locust, as when it attaius sufficient size, it makes excel lent posts for fences, being almost as durable when standing in the ground as red cedar. By a general, earnest effort on the

part of farmers to preserve all that is valuable among their trees, much of to warrant satisfaction to all. Manure heaps containing the seeds are frequently neglected until the vigorous growth induced has brought the plants to inaturity; and many spots around farm buildings and yards are unsightly from a dense annual growth of weeds.
