TERRIBLE RAILROAD ACCIDENT,-The

excursion train containing ten passenger cars bound for the Masonic Pic Nic at Havana, on Wednesday last, just before reaching Millport, was met by a flagman waving ta danger signal. The Engineer immediate ly signaled down breaks and the speed of the train was materially lessened. Another movement of the flagman was interpreted to mean that he could proceed safely when the speed of the train was again increased On rounding the curve just beyond, the last end of the freight train which left Elmira an hour previous was seen just ahead but to late to prevent a collision. The Firemen and Engineer leaped from the Engine and saved themselves. The passengers in the Caboose attached to the freight train also saved themselves by jumping from the car. None but those riding on the platform between the cars were killed or injured. The names of those killed were A. E. Tannary, Lock Haven, Pa., and Franklin True of Elmira. The wounded were D. W. Kingsman, chest injured, ribs and leg broken; Benj. Hancock, compound fracture of leg; Richard Lynch, crushed about the pelvis; Joseph Thomas, flesh wound of leg; the above were from Elmira, and Warren Larnard of Shepard's Creek bruised and injured about the hips. The wounded were immediately cared for by Dr. Pollard of New York. Drs. French and Decker of Elmira und Dr. W. E. Johnson of Waverly. We learn that a number of others were more or less bruised among them Conductor Wentz, but not seriously. It is understood that the cause of the delay on the part of the freight, train was caused by the car coupling giving away breaking up the train three times after leaving Elmira. Ea. WHEREAS, By the act of the Congress of the United States, entitled "An Act to amend the several acts heretofore passed to provide for the ennolling and calling out the National forces, and for other purposes," and aproved March third, one thousand eight hundred and sixty, five, all persons who have deserted the military of raval service of the United States, and who have not been discharged, or relieved from the penalty, or disability therein provided, archemed, and taken, to have voluntarily refinquished, and orfeited their rights of citizen, ship, and are deprived of exercising any rights of citizens thereof:

And thereas, Persons not citizens of the United States are not, under the Constitution and laws of Pennsylvania, qualified electors of this Commonwealth:

SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the zone, That in all elections hereafter to be held in this Commonwealth, it shall be unlawful for the judge or inspectors of the election to receive and Commonwealth, it shall be unlawful for the logge or inspectors of the election to receive any ballot or ballots from any person or persons em-

bands or dated from any person or persons em-braced in the provisions, and subject to the dis-ability imposed by said act of Congress approv-ed March 3, 1865, and it shall be unlawful for any such person to offer to vote any billet, or ballots. allots.

That it any such judge and inspectors of election or any one of them start receive, are consent to receive, any such unlawful ballot or ballots, from any such disqualified person, he, or they so offending, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof in any court, of quarter sessions of this Commonwealth, he shall, for each offence, better the court of monwealth, he shall, for each offence, be rent need to pay a fine of not less than \$100, and undergo an imprisonment, in the jail of the proper county, for not less than 60 days.

That if any person deprived cicitzenseip, and disqualified as aforesead, shall at any election he eafter to be held in this commonwealth, gote or tender to the officers thereof, and offer to vote a ballot, or ballots, any person, so offending, shall us deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction thereof, in any court of quarter sessions of this Commonwealth. son, so offending, shall us deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction thereof, in any court of quarter sessions of this Commonwealth shall, for each offence, be punished in like mainner as is provided in the preceding section of this act, in the case of officers of election receiving such unlawful ballot, or hallots.

SECTION 4. That if any person shall hereafter persuade, or advise, any person, or persons deprived of citizenship, and disqualified as afore said to offer any ballot or hallots, to the officers of any election, hereafter to be held in this Commonwealth, or shall persuade, or advise, any such officer to receive any ballot, or hallots from any person deprived of citizenship, and disqualified as aforesaid; such person, so offending, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, in any court of quarter essions of this Commonwealth, shall be junished in like manner as is provided in the second section of this act, in the case of officers of such election, receiving such unlawful ballot, or ballots.
