The election of Col. Mason will be urged from the North, with entire unanimity and with great earnestness. No more complimentary vote will be desired, or sought for. If there is, anything in the claims of sections, (in the distribution of public offices, they are always considered) then the demand of the North, is entitled to the favorable consideration of the Republicans of the State. We shall expect to see the fidelity and reliability of the North acknowledged by the election of Col. Mason.

OUR FRIENDS WHO STAYED FROM THE POLLS.
