Agricultural Care and Attention, In many operations of the farm it is the care given, the watchful attention bestowed that warrants success -the particular time at which a job is done—if so be it is done well and receives after attention—is certainly a secondary matter. True, there may be a period when certain operations will be much surer to succeed than if performed at another time-and the more favorable conditions the farmer can take advantage of the better, but in no case is the care to which we

have alluded to be set aside and regarded as of on no account, simply because the operation was, according to the books, performed at the right season of the year. "Whatever is worth doing at all is worth doing well." and most farm work well done. and well taken care of will generally succeed if performed at almost any season of the year. In no business with which we are

acquainted, will attention to details pay a better return, and in none is it more neglected than upon the farm. What merchant, manufacturer, or mechanic, having capital invested in his business, and desiring to make it pay the best return, would not be deemed grossly improvident if he paid no more attention to the minute matters of his business than the great majority of farmers do, and would it not be expected he would fail? Farmers plant seeds and trees, care for them but imperfectly, and are disappointed if they do not have a large crop. Would the merchant or manufacturer expect to make money if he purchased articles, and through his own negligence allowed them to waste and become valuless upon his hands? But for the kindliness and forbearance of our "mother earth," the crops consigned to her, would, with the ill care so often bestowed, return again to the farmer but the seed sown, which, in many instances, is as much as he deserves.

When will the lesson be learned and practised by all who call themselves farmers? that good care and and attention bestowed alike to soil, animals and crops, is sure to bring a more than tenfold reward, and go far towards making up the deficiencies of an unfavorable season, and perhaps the effects of the wrong time of performing the operation. this care, do the work whenever the best time occurs, success will be impossible - Maine Farmer W. -Effect of BAD SEED .- How slight a thing will sometimes have serious ef- PINE APPLES, PEACHES, PLUMS fect. ABOUT FUEL.—The season is at hand when the fuel question will be of importance to the farmer. Those who with forethought and labor provided at the proper season for such work a sufficiency, are in good condition to look white winter in the face : but if your fuel for the ensuing six months DRY GOODS OF ALL VARIETIES, is yet standing in the forest, his grim countenance may be suggestive of snowy work and sputtering fires that you to travel

Some dry wood can be gleaned by gathering the dead poles and trees before deep snows fall, and there is one comfort in this work, which is that you are thereby effecting a saving of more valuable timber and bringing your forest into a better state of culture. After this you can select the the best kinds of wood for burning green; probably hickory stands foremost, then maple and beech; oak is perhaps the worst of all com mon wood for burning in an unseasoned state, yet when well seasoned under cover, is one of the very best, ranking next to hickory. If the time is short in which to season the fuel. split it fine and pile it out of doors in a situation well exposed to sun and wind. It is best to put only one or at most, two tiers in a place, as this gives the wind better action on the wood By timely and efficient action in the matter, with some aid from the stove oven to dry the morning supply, one can get along and not suffer seriously from lack of dry wood. Often there is a partial supply of the latter on hand, in which case it is best to eke it out by mixing green with it, but in any case make and keep one good resolution, namely, to provide this winter plenty of cut fuel to last one year.

LAND OCCUPIED BY FENCES.—The Country Gentleman says: "The ma terials and labor repair are among the heavy items of farm expenses.-The cost of the land upon which they stand is another item, on which J. Harris, of Rochester, discourses as follows in the American Agriculturist:

"How much land does an old-fashioned fence occupy? I have always thought it took up a good deal of land, but never had the curiosity to measure. But last summer we had been building a stone wall along the whole west side of the farm, and after it was completed, and the old fence removed, I was surprised at the quantity of land we had gained. The ground, of course, n.ight have been ploughed closer to the fence, but stating the case as it actually was, the old rail fence with stones, weeds, rubbish, etc., occupied a strip of land one rod wide.
