THE PREE RAILROAD LAW.

A Free Railroad Bill passed the House of Representatives quanimous ly on Wednesday last. It provides that any number of citizens of Penn sylvania, not less than nine, may as sociate together for the purpose of constructing maintaining and operating a railroad for the public use, and shall be chartered as a corporation upon filing the necessary documents in the office of the Secretary of the Commonwealth. Not less than four thousand dollars per mile in length of the proposed road must be subscried, and proper officers elected, before the application for a charter is filed. The capital stock must consist of at Roads must be opened within six interim. vears of the time when they are commenced. When the necessary provisons have been complied with such companies shall be entitled to all the right s, powers and privileges, and be subject to all the restrictions and liabilities of the act regulating railroad companies, approved February 19, 1840, and the several supplements thereto. Bailroad companies formed under this law may borrow not exceeding \$20,000 per mile, but not to greater amount that the capital stock subscribed, at a rate of interest not exceeding seven per cent. The othr provisions relate to details, not of interest to the general public. This bill will undoubtedly pass the Senate
