ANCHOR ICE .- Mr. Editor: "What is the reason of the formation of anchor ive?" is a question which has been frequentto which a great variety of answers has been given. It is a well established fact that pure water reaches its maximum specific gravity at a trifle below 40 degrees on temperature; that ice is nothing but water tals form at the surface; and that crystalization (freezing) takes place in a comparatively undisturbed liquid. With regard to anchor ice some of these facts seem to be contradicted. The ice forms in running water, and is collected on the stones at the bottom of the stream, until the mass becomes large enough for its specific gravity to overcome its cohesion to the stones, when it rises, frequently bringing up the stones and gravel to which it was attached. New Haven, Feb. 17, 1868. Rev. DAVID CRAFT.—Dear Sir: In reply to your inquiry about anchor ice, I believe the view held is, that the water where it forms has become cooled down to the freezing point, although without ice forming in the mass; and that when in this state, the stones, which are prominent objects in the bottom, become the nuclei of crystalization and determine its taking place, as happens from the influence of prominent points in the bottom of a crystalizing solution. The water moreover is generally rapidly running water, and the motion seems to act in pre-venting the freezing of it at the surface until it has reached a temperature much be-low, or somewhat below what would be relow, or somewhat beau, quired in still water.
