**KILLED.**—A laborer at work on the rail-road opposite town, named Parsons Holzemer, was buried by a slide of earth, on Thursday last, and so severely injured that he died the same evening. He was from Elmira, where he has a wife and family.

The grading for the rail-road through town, has reached Bridge street, and workmen are excavating a passage through the embankment near the bridge. The rail-road will pass underneath the street, which will necessitate the grade of the street being raised about four feet above its present level. Below Bridge street houses and barns, are being moved, to "clear the track" for the road.

Large flocks of pigeons have attracted the attention of sportsmen and others, in their flight, and we learn that they are "posting" in Fox township, Sullivan county. The immense number of pigeons gathered in a "post" must be seen to be comprehended. They gather literally by millions, and are so tame that the sport of killing them, is simply shungher. We are informed that last week, one party caught fifteen dozen in a net, at one haul. Two men from Alba brought caught forty dozen in one day, with nets. Others are shot, and even killed with clubs. The first shot is sold in New York, at \$25 per dozen.

**TERMINAL ACCIDENT.**—The new steam plating mill belonging to Harry Hoffmann, Esq., situated about three-fourths of a mile south of Dushore, was almost completely demolished by the explosion of the boiler, on Monday last. Five or six men were at work in the mill at the time, all of whom were save or less injured, and two of the number, Mr. John Hoffmann, and the engineer, whose name we have not learned, were dangerously scalped, but hope is entertained of their recovery. Nearly every board was blown off the framework of the building, the machinery rendered useless, while portions of the boiler were thrown twenty or thirty rods from the scene of disaster. The only wonder is that every man in the mill was not instantly killed. —*Report Free Press.*

Munckin, across Owego Creek in the town of Owego, was entered on last Sunday night through a window, and a suit of clothes stolen, in the place of which the thief left his old worn-out garments. John Standam was arrested for the burglary by Policeman Isaac Wazenski, and Justice Gray committed him to jail awaiting the action of the next Court of Sessions.

Marion Conner stole a suit of clothes of Mr. Horvitz of Binghamton, was overhauled in Syracuse, by Constable Wadsworth and brought back; tried before Justice Bowditch and sentenced to five months' confinement at hard labor at Rochester, whither he was conveyed by Policeman Wixson on Tuesday last.

A stranger, calling himself Gia Spencer, was arrested at the depot in this village a few days ago, by Policeman Morrison, for stealing an overcoat; and it turned out that he was the same party who some two weeks ago broke into the house of John L. Weston, at Campville, and stole a double-barreled shotgun. He, too, was passed over to Sheriff Thaddeus, who will furnish a list of his board and lodgings at the public expense, until the June Sessions, when Judge T. C. Atkinson will doubtless give him a free ticket down to the land and thence to Auburn.
