

News from all Nations.

Hon. Wm. A. Harrison, of the Supreme Court of Appeals of West Virginia, has sent his resignation, to take effect Jan. 1, 1863.

Miss Letta Moore, employed in the packing-room of the Russell & Erskine Manufacturing Company, at New-Britain, Conn., was instantly killed on Wednesday morning by the falling of the floor immediately over the place where she was sitting at her work.

Two men were fatally injured in Chicago yesterday by the falling of a wall of a Catholic hospital in course of erection.

A boiler explosion occurred in the stoves works of T. W. Gibbs & Co., of Troy, N. Y., yesterday afternoon, by which three men were seriously injured. The building was damaged to the amount of \$15,000.

The captain, steward, two Chinese cooks and one passenger of the steamboat Silesia, were drowned on Wednesday by the sinking of that vessel, at the mouth of the Passaic River. The steamer was loaded with cattle for New-Orleans.

The King of the Sandwich Islands, in consideration of the philanthropic services of Capt. Thomas Moore, of Hilo, in distributing relief to the sufferers by the recent volcanic eruptions, has made that gentleman a Knight of the Order of Kamehameha First.

Gov. Fairchild, of Wisconsin, has issued a proclamation offering a reward of \$500 for the arrest of William Kidd, who murdered Miss Kata Jordan a week since by cutting her throat with a razor while riding in her carriage.

An association has been formed in Washington to raise \$30,000 from the colored people of the country to provide a bunting for Gen. Howard. It is proposed to collect one cent from each colored person, which might not be very difficult, but will probably squelch it.

Ex-Gov. Buckingham arrived at his home in Norwich, Conn., on Wednesday evening.

Information from all points of the Northwest to the effect that crops of all kinds never looked more promising, while the breadth of ground plowed is largely in excess of any previous season.

The Commissioners of Antietam Cemetery, at their meeting in Washington on the 17th inst., recommended the vote by which the resolution authorizing the burial of the Confederate dead in the Cemetery was adopted some months since. The subject was then postponed until the 17th of November next.

The Baltimore School Board has adopted, by a vote of four to four, the report of their committee in favor of excluding colored teachers from employment in the colored schools.

Huber Kimball, the second President of the Mormon Church, died at Salt Lake on Monday.

Michael Dacs died at Milbury, Mass., one day last week, from injuries received by being thrown from a wagon the day before.

The jury, in the case of Mrs. Victor on trial at Cleveland, Ohio, for poisoning her brother, William Parquet, with arsenic, in February, 1861, one day last week rendered a verdict of guilty.

About 100 arrests were made at New Orleans, Monday, by the U. S. Marshal, of persons suspected of belonging to a filibustering expedition to Mexico in the colored schools.

Gico Palipher, a middle aged man, fell dead of heart disease, at Union City, on the 12th inst.

The bail of Dan Noble, indicted for grand larceny in Chemung county, has been fixed at \$700,000.

The Grand Jury at Canandaigua having failed to find a bill against Samuel VanCampen for defrauding the First National Bank of Elmira, has been discharged from arrest.

Hugh J. Baldwin is repairing the store which was partly consumed by fire a few days ago in Waverly; so says the Advocate.

James R. Young, for many years a resident of Bath, N. Y., attempted suicide Wednesday morning, in that village, by placing the muzzle of a pistol to his ear and discharging it. The ball went through the face near the nose, making a frightful wound. Despondency was the cause of this rash act. It is thought that he will recover.

Alonzo Winchell, of Bath, was badly bitten by a rat-like snake one day last week. He neglected to take the necessary remedies and at last accounts it was feared he would lose his life.

The Ithaca Journal reports two cases of drowning in that village last week. One a girl of eight years who fell into the lake, the other a colored boy of five years who fell into it.

The extensive nail works and nail plate mill belonging to the Pottstown Iron Company, at Pottstown, Penn., were completely destroyed by fire about noon Saturday. The fire originated in the heating furnace. The loss was estimated from outside sources to be from \$100,000 to \$150,000, nearly all of which it is understood was covered by insurance. The factory, rolling mill and other buildings belonging to the Company were uninjured.

A personal difficulty between John B. Brownlow, of the Knoxville Whig, and Mr. Kirby of the Press, took place on Thursday afternoon. Brownlow tried to shoot Kirby, but his pistol snapped without hitting any one.

Gov. Baker and Lieut.-Gov. Voorhees, of Louisiana, have been removed by order of Gen. Grant, and Meares, Warrington and Dunn have been appointed to fill the vacancies.

The trial of the prisoners at Atlanta, Ga., accused of the murder of George W. Asburn, in Columbus, was to have commenced on Monday last.

Jefferson Davis, while coming down stairs with one of his children in his arms, in the hotel at Lenoxville, Canada, Saturday, fell and injured his back. He was unable to attend the convocation of Bishop's College.

As Dr. S. W. Miller, Clerk of the Courts of Wayne County, was playing a game of cards with some friends in Greenville in that county, on the afternoon of the 14th inst., a person unknown fired a shot through an open window, beside which he was sitting, striking near the left temple and passing through the brain, resulting in instant death. The murderer escaped.

The assessed value of property in Nebraska is \$32,000,000, an increase of \$11,000,000 since last year.

Nicholas Zoolinger, of Harrisburg, was run over by a train of cars near his residence Thursday. Both legs were taken off and he died soon after.

LEADING PROVISIONS OF THE TAX BILL.

ANOTHER PRESIDENTIAL VETO.

The House, late Friday afternoon, concurred in the amendments to the tax bill, reported from the Committee of Ways and Means, and the bill will now go to the Senate for its action.

The tax is 50 cents for every proof gallon of spirits. Spirits to be bonded, warehouses must be within six months, and pay, in addition to the direct tax, a special tax of \$4 a barrel of forty gallons.

The bonded warehouse system for spirits is abolished, and the collection of the tax at the distillery is required.

On spirits and rum for exportation, and on which all the taxes have been paid, there is a drawback of not exceeding fifty cents a gallon.

The more consumption of time by retaining the bill in a very small polity in the House, the less time will be given to the Constitutional question.

The bill has been sent to the Senate, but it has not yet been voted upon.

The bill has been selected
