pruning, seek now to guide the sap and growth into canes for next year's fruiting, and also into strong and healty leaves on those already seting with fruit, carefully and severely rubbing out all buds or young shoots that tend to crowd the vine with foliage and at the same time extract supply from the roots. The simplest, and we believe the best method, is that of renewal canes from the ground yearly; and the vine should now be carefully studied, to judge of its capacity to fruit another season or two, bree or more canes, and such should be left and carefully guarded not even a laternal touch during the seasonbut all others should be rubbed out and kept out.

Farmers Shoe Grease-

Put into some fire-proof vessel one-fourth of pound of lard, or soft grease like lard, one-fourth of a pound of tallow-beef or mutton tallow-one fourth of a pound of beeswax; half a pint of linseed oil, three or four table apoonful of lampblack, and a peice of pulverized gum camphor as larg as a ben's egg. Melt the ingredients over a slow fire, and stir them thoroughly after they are melted. Never heat pint of linseed oil, three or four table so Lot asito make it boil. Soft grease which has salt in will not injure leather. Now have the leather warm, and warm the grease, not so that it will flow, but have it to soft that it may be applied with a brush. When a man's boots are exposed to wet all day, he should wash them clean at night, hang them in the kitchen, where the leather will dry gradually, and put on a little grease every morning. It is far better to grease a little often than to grease bountifully every ten or twelve days. Leather should not be allowed to become very dry before greasing. What Railroads do for Farmers

What Railroads do for Farmers

To haul 40 bushels of corn 50 miles on a wagon would cost at least \$12 for team and driver and expenses.—
A railroad would transport it for \$4 at most. Allowing an average of 40 bushels per acre, the crop would be worth \$8 more per acre, or 5 per cent. on \$100. As the relative advantage is about the same for other crops, it is clear that a railroad passing through a town would add \$110 per acre to the value of the farms. A town 10 miles square contains 64,000 acres. An increase of \$100 per acre is equal to \$6,400,000, or enough to build 200 miles of railroad, even if it cost \$32. 000 per mile. But 200 miles of railroad would extend through twenty towns ten miles square, and cost but \$10 per scre if taxed upon the land. These figures are given merely as an illustration. DAIRY PRODUCTS.—Many Americans have been astonished at the millions of pounds of American cheese shipped to England, both for consumption there and re-shipment with English labels to this country. The quantity of milk sold has increased from 20,000,000 to 29,000,000 gallons within ten years, and the cheese from 38,000,000 to 72,000,000 pounds within the same time, while the but-ter production has fallen off. Because New York has a foreign market for her cheese, she should not neglect her home market for butter. Large as the production is, it should be larger, and easily could be.
