When he was offered forty cents per pound for his butter, he said "he would take it home again if he could not get fifty. When offered 10 cents per pound for his dried apples, he said he would take them home again if he could not get a shilling. And so it is, you occasionally meet with such soulless men; they want the very highest price for all they have to sell, but are not willing to pay a fair living price for a newspaper, which more than compensates them ten times over during the year. We are very thankful that we have but few such men on our subscription list. When the subscription price was a dollar, just such men as is described above would ask you to take fifty cents. When potatoes were 25 cents per bushel; newspapers could be afforded at a dollar, but now potatoes are 75 cents, and these lillle men can see no difference when the odd fifty is coming into their pockets.—Ithaca Dem.
