

### Gardening.

#### High Right.

Those who wish a successful orchard should begin right, and have the entire land for the orchard deeply plowed and subsoiled, then enriched, and again plowed and re-plowed until the soil is made fine and rich, then mark out the places for the trees, and when ready to plant set that they are carefully examined, root and branch, that every broken or bruised root or branch is carefully cut off with a sharp knife.

Never manure trees and plants with green manure. Always let it be old and well rotted, and then carefully mixed, and not too much of it near the roots; better on the surface, and then covered with gypsum, which will retain the ammonia and moisture of it at the same time.

The planter of trees should always remember, too, that the top and branches of the tree should always be more than the roots; for, if the roots, when they take hold, have too great space to feed with their sap, the sap runs slow, and often cannot feed the branches, and death of the tree is the result. Whereas, if the branches and top are small, the roots grow vigorously and strong, and then the roots will seek more food, and will restore a better top than any cut off when planted.

One of the greatest errors of tree-planters is to leave too much top on the trees for the roots to sustain; and the new-planter should start with the top often half from having to many months too feed. Planters of trees, if they will read more of the nature of a fruit-tree, its circulation of sap, root, and branch, we should see greater success in tree-planting. - *Cultivator's Farmer.*

#### A New Method of Grafting.

Mr. S. Hutchinson, of New Hampshire, is said to have invented a new method of grafting for which he has received a patent. We have no doubt as to the patent being a good thing, and as the gentleman is so well provided, there will certainly be no harm in giving his secret to the readers of *Horsho's Home*.

In many of our books on horticulture, the method of making layers is given, and when a branch is situated so high upon a tree that it cannot be brought down to the earth, then the earth is carried up to the branch. Supposing we wish to make a branch of an apple tree produce roots, from any particular part, we have only to surround it with soil, moss, some similar substance, and keep it moist until roots are produced, just the same as though it was near enough to the earth to bend it down and cover with soil. In making layers of some kinds of trees, it is necessary or cut through the bark before enclosing it with soil. Now, Mr. Hutchinson proposes not to wait for the production of roots, but to insert them into the branch, and in doing this the branch is scarified, and if the grafts do not unite, new roots will be very likely to be emitted from the wounds. Now, we hope, for the sake of the patent, that our inventor will not insist on his experiment to be tried like the apple, pear, willow, and other kinds that emit roots very readily from layers, but give the public some examples of grafting upon the hickory, linden, ash, black-walnut, etc. If it works well on these trees, then we will be ready to say that his new method of grafting is of some value.

#### Purifying Cistern-Water.

It is frequently the case that cistern-water becomes offensive, and unfit for use, which in its pure state is the sweetest and wholesomest of all water. To destroy this offensiveness, lime has been recommended, a large lump or two, but this method frequently used with good effect; but then which is most efficient, is a correspondent in Rhode Island assures us, is to let the supplying spout run to the bottom of the cistern. The fresh water being heavier than the old, forces the latter to the surface and is thus consumed before it becomes offensive, and so on at each main filling, like like being a remedy for what has been so much complained of, and will be an answer to many inquiries made of us on the subject. But there are certain conditions that should be observed by all having a cistern, the first of which is that it should be thoroughly cleaned twice a year, and the second that the conductors on the roof should be served in the same way. - *Germantown Telegraph.*

#### Why do Eggs Spoil.

We find the shell a thin skin, which, when kept in a healthy condition by the albumen of the egg, is impervious to air; but if the egg remains too long in one position, the yolk being heavier than the albumen, gradually sinks through it, and comes in contact with the shell, thus destroying the impurities requisite for keeping the skin lubricated and healthy; the skin soon becomes dry and porous, to air, which penetrates through it to the yolk, causing the mass to rot. Therefore, the true plan is to keep the yolk in its central position. By doing this, the egg can be preserved for a long time. - *Eclectic.*

#### How to Make Shingles Last.

Shingles Brown says that twenty-five years ago he dipped shingles in a large kettle of lime water before they were laid. A few shingles were dipped in oil over one at a time, long enough to soak them well, and then thrown aside to dry. In a short time the shingles were thus prepared. Although they were then treated with shingles, they have lasted twenty-five years, and may do so for years to come. Several experiments of a similar character have been made since, with very successful results.

#### An "accruate farmer"

has given the *Country Gentleman* his experience in feeding cut feed and meal to his horses. He cuts out straw to the length of an inch, and mixes with this corn meal and bran in equal quantities, and so feeds that each horse has a bushel of the straw, and three quarts of the meal and bran, twice a day. One hundred pounds of this mixture will support a horse in good health. He has also found that he finds will keep a working horse in good condition. It is satisfied that it costs less than two-thirds the cost of keeping a horse on uncut dry hay and whole grain.

#### Care for the Toothache.

Toothache, according to the London *Lancet*, can be cured by the following preparation of carbonic acid. To one drachm of carbonic acid, add two drachms of water, and mix well. A portion of the solution, inserted in the cavity of the aching tooth, invariably gives relief.
