

## NEWS FROM ALL NATIONS.

The debt of Mexico is only \$15,000,000,000. New coal discoveries are reported in Nova Scotia. Simon B. Anthony will make a return tour as far as Colorado. State Senator Cobb of New York left an estate of one million. Fanny Farmer is said to still quit her Henry house after the race. The Alabama and Chattanooga Railroad is complete to Etowah. A horse railroad between Tuscaloosa and Gadsden is spoken of. The locomotive works at Bessemer are employing more hands than ever before. Hamburg, Berks county, is destined to be the shipping point of the Schuylkill coal.

Professor J. W. Gibbs has discovered a new element, Diphosphorus, near Dayton, Ohio.

The wife of James President of Mexico is ill, and hope of her recovery are abandoned. Vessels arriving from Philadelphia are now guaranteed five days at New York. Maritime Miners and Gold production is up 1000 per cent. Gold production is 2233 people.

The Philadelphia, Wilmington and Baltimore Railroad Company are laying steel rails north of Baltimore.

Christian Vanpool died in Miami, Monroe County, recently, at the advanced age of 90 years.

Work is reported that General A. Dix will be in the field in the fall of 1870 over three thousand acres in Shelby county.

Over 300,000 sacks of wheat have recently been shipped from San Francisco to Great Britain.

The citizens of Rutland, Vt., will celebrate their first centennial on Wednesday, October 5, 1870.

The lowland wheat crop of 1870 is reported to be 400,000 bushels, and will last 24,000 bushels.

Decatur, Ill., is to have a rolling mill as soon as the works can be erected. It will employ 225 hands.

About \$160,000 worth of silver bars were cast through Omaha in one day last week, from California.

A resident of Delavan, Wis., has started a newspaper, Franklin's newspaper, dated February 14, 1870.

A second track over the entire length of the Syracuse, Binghampton and New York Railroad will be laid next spring.

The Selma, Rome and Dalton (Ga.) Railroad will in a few days pass from the board of directors recently elected.

Mr. James Burk, of Morgan county, is in his healthiest rear. His name is Morgan, and has long resided in that city.

The farmers of Crawford county, Kan., are making preparations for sowing twice as much wheat this fall as in any preceding year.

The census of the boroughs of York shows a population of 15,000,000 of citizens. In 1860 it was 7714. Increases over 6000.

The Berlin Courier, (Wisconsin) estimates the yield of apples within a radius of eight miles from Berlin, as not less than 30,000 bushels.

A Wisconsin paper mentions a case where burglar broke into a store, but the goods were marked so high that they would not take any away.

The most extensive railroad bridge in the world is being constructed on the Connecticut Air-line Railroad, near Rockaway.

Another overwhelming misfortune has overtaken the British Empire. Malaria has broken out in India, and has spread to the British possessions in Ceylon.

A black snake was killed in Ohio which measured eleven feet, was ten inches in circumference, and weighed one hundred pounds.

The census of Frederick city, Md., for 1870, will be only a fraction over 9000. Many calculators estimated a population between 12,000 and 15,000.
