**DEMOCRATIC SOLDIERS!**

We have seen many "vain tricks" perpetrated by the sham Democracy to delude the people, but none that equalled the nomination and support of a candidate for Congress, on the ground of his having been a "soldier." Why, it is still fresh in our recollection when a Democrat would step off the side-walk to avoid contact with the soldier, so heartily did he despise a "Lincoln hater." Do the "boys in blue" forget how often around the camp-fire, they discussed the traitors at home, and registered an oath that they would charge upon them with ballots, when they returned, with the same good will they charged with bullets upon their friends in the rebel lines? The soldier who served through the war, and came home a Democrat, was no more a partisan than a patriot, and his labor to uphold the flag of his country in the field, he forfeits fair renown, when he coalesces with those who sought to overthrow the government by treasonable actions, or by lukewarmness.

Capt. Brockway may have been a gallant soldier in the field; he may be an estimable citizen. We will not gainsay either. But his constituency, so to call them, were the most ardent rebel sympathizers in the land. The men who placed him in nomination organized the Fishing Creek conspiracy to prevent the operation of the draft. By reason of their treasonable action, the soldiers of the United States were called from their legitimate duties, to overcome and arrest traitors in Columbia county. Capt. Brockway was fighting rebels at the front; his friends were doing their utmost to advance the rebel cause at home. Did he ever utter a word of rebuke of their treason, as would have become a gallant soldier and true patriot?

The soldier who becomes a tool in the hands of those who sought to embarrass the Government in the prosecution of the war, rejecting at rebel success, and hoping for the overflow of the loyal armies, stultifies himself, and forfeits all the honor he has gained upon the battlefield. He proves that it was the love of glory, not of country, that influenced him; else he would not fraternize with the enemies of the country when he puts off his uniform.

The reputation gained at the cannon's mouth is squandered and tarnished by contact with disloyal men. It is such as Capt. Brockway in the thickest of battle had ordered his men to turn their backs toward the loyal lines. The spectacle of a soldier being used by the Democracy for political purposes, is humiliating to every veteran who has faced rebel bullets.

**THE PET LAMB.**

The Democratic party stand upon record as having endorsed border-ruffianism in Kansas; as having adopted the doctrine of James Buchanan, and his Secretary of State, that the Constitution of the United States conferred no power upon the President to coerce a State seeking to secede from the Union; and when the rebels at Charleston turned the guns stolen from the Union, upon our own citadel, that party refused to vote money for arming and equipping volunteers for the suppression of the rebellion; when it became necessary to resort to drafts to fill up the depleted ranks of the Union army, the Democratic party cried out against it as unconstitutional. When Abraham Lincoln issued the emancipation proclamation, and it was proposed to employ colored soldiers in the Union army, the Democratic party said, "No. Every measure calculated to promote the success of the war for the suppression of the rebellion was opposed and obstructed by the Democratic party. Every measure looking to the reconstruction of the lately rebellious States upon the basis of loyalty to the Union—every measure for the raising of revenue adequate for paying the interest upon the war debt and defraying the ordinary expenses of the government, all have been opposed by the Democratic party, and made the rallying cry of opposition to the success of Republicanism. Every soldier then who entered the Union army and earnestly fought for the suppression of the rebellion, was fighting and acting against the avowed principles and policy of the so-called Democratic party. A few of that class of soldiers known as McClellan's dress parade men, adhere to the Democratic party, and their fate when they come before the people for their suffrage, is the same as that of their illustrious leader when he ran for the presidency, under and overhwhelming defeat. A true soldier is out of place in the ranks of the Democratic party and is seldom found there; as much out of place as the boy's "pet lamb" among the snooty sheep of the flock. A kind father at his death left his estate to his two sons, the eldest grown up to full manhood; the youngest had nursed and reared a "pet lamb," which had come to be a great favorite. Upon a division of the entire flock of sheep, which was to be equal between the two brothers, the eldest thought he would secure the valuable sheep of the flock by making use of his brother's attachment to the "pet," to play off a dishonest cheat, or trick upon him. He proceeded to select one of the unhealthy, snooty, scrawny, meandily looking sheep, and put the "pet lamb" in with them, and put equal number of the good sheep together. Supposing that his brother's attachment for his lamb would of course induce him to take the poor sheep, because "Teddy," the pet, was with them, he called him out to take his choice. The younger brother looked at "Teddy," and his miserable associates, and said, "Teddy, I have nursed you ever since your birth; my attachment is very strong for you; I regret to part with you, but I cannot take you in such company. I must let you go," and made choice of the good sheep.

A soldier, (unless he be an ex-rebel), is as much out of place as a candidate of the Democratic party, as was "Teddy," among the scoundrels of the flock.

The fall elections are doing wonders for the Republican party. This is manifestly a bearing year. The policy of the administration is telling with the people. The steady reduction of the taxes and the debt is not without a salutary effect. It is a tangible argument which no sophistry can resist. It is a solid and substantial fact about which the people cannot be deceived. The effect is being shown by the result of the elections. Not only Maine and Vermont stand "firm in their shoes," but far off Colorado and Wyoming give answering sympathy and reduce themselves from the pariah of Democratic rule. These are unmistakable indications of what is yet to come. Ohio and Pennsylvania in October, and New York in November will range themselves on the right side and swell the file of popular content. Let Republicans gear their own armor to make their decision both decisive and emphatic. A bare majority will answer where no more can be obtained, but we are entitled to a margin of a good many thousands, and let us see to it that we have it. A crusher is always better than bare success by the "skin of the teeth."

**THE LAW CREATORS.**

The law creators, passed upon the subject of the judicial district, without the aid of the people. It was a court, and the county was divided within the last five years.
