First. That the right of an owner or lessee

First. That the right of an owner or lessee and operator of a colliery to the entire and exclusive contral and management of his works, is guaranteed to him by the law of the land, and is of such an unquestionable character that it ought not to be interfered with either directly or indirectly.

Second. The impire concurs with and adopts as a correct statement of the law that part of the late proclamation of the Executive of this Commonwealth, wherein he says that "It is inlawful for any person or association of persons, by violence, threats or any other coercive means, to prevent any laborers or miners from working when they please, for whom they please and at such wages as they please, and alike unlawful, by such violence or threats to deter or prevent the owners or operators of mines from employing whomsoever they may choose to employ and as such wages as may be agreed upon between the omployer and persons employ.

Third. It is the undoubted right of men to refuse to work except upon such terms as shall be agreeable to them; but a general understanding, that no person of a particular association of laborers shall work for any operator who has in his employ a member of such association, it contrary to the policy of the law, and subversive of the best interest of the miners and their employers. An association may inside this upon its members for breach of its by-laws, and expel for non-payment, but it has no right by combined action to place the defaulter in the light of an otillaw in the fransaction of business with others.

Fourth. The umpire decides that it is comtrary to the spirit of the law as stated secondly above, for a body of men to agree not to work because their employer refuses to employ a particular person, or because he has discharged such person. If such a case arises where the act of the operator is deemed to be oppressive, and he refuses to redress the wrong, it is a proper one for local arbitration, by which, in most cases, the difficulty could be properly settled without the disastrous consequences arising, both to the employers and the employed by a strike, even at one colliers.

Fifth. As persons of sound mind and competent age are permitted by law to bargain for themselves, their contracts in regard to labor at mines should be held as sacred as other contracts, and should not be annulled or set aside
