BEATH, OF SCHUYLKILL. THE CONVENTION. We give in another column the proceedings of the Republican State Convention, which assembled in Harrisburg last week.

REPUBLICAN STATE CONVENTION. The Republican State Convention assembled in the House of Representatives at Harrisburg, on Wednesday, the 19th inst., and was called to order at 10 o'clock by the chairman of the State Central Committee. Nearly every district in the State was fully represented. James R. KELLEY, of Washington county, was elected temporary chairman. Mr. JOHNSON, of Crawford, offered the following:

FROM WASHINGTON. WASHINGTON, May 19.—The Congressional Record, containing their meeting to-day, adopted the following resolutions: Resolved, That for the present a sub-committee of eight members be appointed to proceed at once with the investigation and to continue the same as long as they deem it expedient, with authority to take testimony wherever they consider it available by a sub-committee of their own number, and to report all testimony that they may obtain to the full committee at a meeting to be held on the twentieth day of September next, or at such earlier time as the sub-committee shall notify the joint select committee to meet; at which time the sub-committee shall wish to make any report to the full committee first named shall report to be in a disturbed condition, and such other localities as the committee may deem necessary.

FROM HARRISBURG. The House some days since voted to adjourn on Tuesday last, but BUCKALEW and WALLACE refused to allow the Senate to consider the bill. The Senate persistently refuses to pass a bill calling a Constitutional Convention. The passage of such a bill would place within the control of the people the power to stop special legislation, and thus shorten the sessions of the House to about one half.

FROM WASHINGTON. The average tone of comment on the treaty of Washington is exceedingly favorable. Of forty or fifty journals whose expressiveness have been, only one (the Washington Patriot, a Democratic sheet) conducted in the spirit of 1850. The World says: "We seem to treat it as a party question; but even in a party view we should be compelled to advocate its acceptance. If it is a just treaty, and is so esteemed by the wiser part of the public, a caviling partisan opposition would react against us." In this light we hope the work of the Commission will be viewed, and a peaceful settlement earnestly sought.
