In 1870 the Pa. & N. Y. Railroad sold at this station 50,000 passenger tickets, amounting to \$1,871.05. In 1871, they sold 100,000 tickets, amounting to \$2,194.11. In 1872, the number of tickets sold was 27,881, amounting to \$90,860.

In 1871, the following Atlantic Coast Co. shipped 8,871 tons of coal. In 1872, the amount shipped was 11,137 tons, showing a handsome increase.
