"The streets and sidewalks of this town cannot be said to be inviting, for there is but little stone sidewalk, and much of the plank walk is, like the streets of Pompeii, 'worn with the tramp of busy feet.' In my 'gl nee' I observed some fine residences and beautiful pleasure grounds, and a handsome brick church, trimmed with a light-gray sandstone, of recent construction, occupying a commanding site well up towards the mountain base. Near the upper end of the town an Episcopal Church is going up, the basement of which is composed of the same light-gray sandstone above mentioned, which stone has at a distance much the appearance of marble.
