The first survey for the Barcley road was made as early as 1839. From the Historical Collections of Pennsylvania, published at Philadelphis in 1843, we take the following sketch of the borough:

"Towanda, the county seat of Bradford county, is situated near the centre of the county, on the right bank of the North Branch of the Susquehanna river. The dwellings are built with taste, generally of wood, painted white, imparting a remarkably bright and cheerful appearance to the town, as one approaches it from the Wysox valley, just opposite. Besides the usual county buildings the town contains Presbyterian, Methodist and Episcopal churches, an academy and a bank very extensively known. A noble bridge cross-the river at the town. Just below the bridge is the dam and lock of the North Branch canal, which here crosses the river by a pool, thus forming a convenient basin opposite the town.
